Come and See - Go and Tell

"Come and see, go and tell." These words were shared with us by The Most Reverend Laurent Mbanda, Archbishop of Rwanda at the Opening Worship Service for the Mothers' Union (MU) Worldwide Council Meeting in Kigali, Rwanda in June of this year. He informed us that Rwanda was considered "the land of 1000 hills and 1000 smiles" and it was. How fitting that Mothers' Union leaders from 30 provinces worldwide should meet in this beautiful country to reaffirm the essence of who we are and what we do. The Board of Trustees met with Provincial MU Presidents, several observers from around the world and staff from Mary Sumner House to do just that.

The meetings were covered with prayer and worship. We were placed in Family Groups with members from around the world where we gathered each morning and evening to worship. We also met with the Provincial Presidents in our Zonal Groups. In Zone B, I met with the presidents from Canada, USA, West Indies, South America and Brazil to develop an action plan for the coming year.

As a membership, we agreed on the impact and change we wish to make across the world in the years approaching our 150th anniversary of the movement in 2026. During our time together and in preparation for this meeting we had listened to the voices of over 200,000 members who over the last two years have worked through the MULOA process (Mothers' Union Listens, Observes and Acts) to discern how we will transform the communities where

we live and work. Based on our work together, we established the following principles:

Our identity: Mothers' Union is a global, women led, volunteer movement. United in our diversity and living out our faith, we support individuals and families to transform their lives. Embedded in the Church and community, we have unprecedented reach that gives a voice to the stigmatized and vulnerable round the world.

I heard from Judith how MU facilitators in the Parenting Program have transformed families in Guyana by establishing support groups where parents learn from each other about parenting. One woman cited, "It helped me to be a good parent" and a father stated that after taking the program, "I realize it is not good to beat children." ence: The differences we aspire to make are in the areas of gender justice, safety, self-reliance and

peace and safety, self-reliance and restored relationships with God, each other, the environment and the stigmatized.

I heard from Thembsie how through the MULOA process in South Sudan, more than 200 MU members came together from warring tribes in different areas. By listening to each other and sharing experiences, relationships were Continued on Page 2 Continued from Page 1

restored and reconciliation between communities occurred.

Our values: Being non-judgemental, loving and compassionate, persevering and bold.

I heard from Catherine of AMARE members (MU members in Northern Argentina) who took to the streets to pray for young men in gangs who were terrorizing their communities. Many of those young men's lives were transformed and communities restored.

Our approach to working in our communities: First to listen and observe, then to mobilize our own and surrounding resources. We will work to equip those around us to meet the challenges they face, and seek to partner with others enabling us to reach more people, more effectively.

I heard from Daisy, an MU member in Zambia. She stated that after the MU-LOA process her members looked for resources within their community, rather than waiting for 'hand-outs'. They lived in a rural area where grass is abundant; they decided to collect the grass, dry it and make it into brooms to sell in the city areas. Daisy said, "God gives us the resources we need wherever we are."

Our priorities for program and advocacy work: Priorities will include supporting people to achieve stable livelihoods, equipping people with skills in literacy and life skills, and gender justice.

I heard from June in York, whose members started an MU branch in a prison in their community. Female prisoners were enrolled and meetings were held within the prison walls. Once they left the prisons, they were given their badges and invited to join other branches in their communities.

Our work: Our work will focus on making a difference and will be based on our shared priorities. We commit to good financial management, governance and monitoring, evaluation and learning (MEL).

I heard from Ruth in Uganda, where members in one MU diocese wrote a Prenatal Guide book and ran programs to assist young mothers in getting a good start with their pregnancy and family life. Ugandan members also developed their own provincial MU Constitution and developed leadership training programs for their diocesan presidents.

Creating safe spaces: Creating safe spaces for the vulnerable is a key part of what we do; we committed to a collective policy on Safeguarding, and developing and implementing appropriate procedures in line with the guidelines of the Anglican Church.

At our Worldwide Council meeting we developed a Mothers' Union Statement of Commitment for safeguarding our programs globally, which everyone approved both individually as members and collectively as an organization.

Central Charity: We are an interconnected global

movement, sharing with and supporting one another to achieve our common goals. We recognize the need for a central charity to support and coordinate this work and agree to contribute towards the associated costs.

Members at this meeting expressed our continued support for a central body to organize our movement where we have over 4 million members in 84 countries worldwide. Our administrative offices are at Mary Sumner House in London, UK; we wholeheartedly reinforced the love and support which we receive and give to the staff at Mary Sumner House.

> together. I have been blessed to have attended this meeting and met so many women and men of faith from around the world. Amahoro! ('Peace' in Kinyarwanda).



the Mothers' Union Worldwide Council Meeting in Kigali, Rwanda in June. There were over 60 people present including Provincial Presidents, observers, and Mary Sumner House staff. Everyone worked tirelessly all week to achieve principles for the global Mothers' Union to implement until 2026, which will be the 150th anniversary of Central Mothers' Union. Kathleen Snow's article on the discussions at this meeting headlines this newsletter.

120 Years of Faith in Action - HOPE

Be Proactive, Take initiative and Act with Integrity – PTAI. This was the message from The Rev. Michael Elliott at The Church of the Holy Spirit in the Portmore Deanery in Cumberland, Jamaica.

Alice Kennedy, Lilian Ketch, and I recently attended the 120th Anniversary of the Mothers' Union in the Diocese of Jamaica and the Cayman Islands. It was an honour and privilege to be present and share with our Mothers' Union sisters and brothers in celebrating MU's work in their diocese.

We attended worship on the Sunday morning at Rev. Michael's church in Cumberland. The reading for that day was from Luke 16:1-13 about the rich man and his manager who was dishonest. Rev. Michael called the man a 'scammer'. He was currying favour and trying to be proactive in a time of crisis. Rev. Michael shared that Jesus was suggesting that here was a man in crisis who was focusing on what he had to do, and he did it. Jesus wants us to be proactive disciples who take the initiative and act responsibly in our relationships with him and the world around us (adapted from preacherexchange.com).

Rev. Michael stated that nothing focuses us in life like a crisis and that the challenge for us is how we respond. Our initial prayer is "Lord, have mercy." And rightly so – we must be proactive; first and foremost we must give that control over to our Lord in any situation.

He then went on to speak about taking the initiative. We heard about the MU in Cumberland who ran a Children's Home for HIV Children. He shared how the MU members run the home, managing the staff and providing food daily for the children in that Home - an example of taking initiative and acting with integrity.

We are called to be proactive and to act with integrity. We are meant to do the right thing, and quite often without anyone seeing us. Rev. Michael spoke about how we become a people of HOPE when we do the right thing

and act with integrity. **Helping Other People Endure – HOPE.** We need to listen and be clear on what God is saying to us.

During that worship service there were many MU members in attendance. The congregation was a sea of blue and white - the Mothers' Union uniform colours. I had the privilege of meeting Mrs. Louise Bailey, or Aunt Lou as she was affectionately called. Aunt Lou was 103 years of age and had been a Mothers' Union member for over 60 years! What a joy to meet this lovely lady who had worked most of her life supporting the work of MU in her diocese. She has

just recently died and is sadly missed. Helping Other People Endure – HOPE.

On our first day in Jamaica I was asked to speak about MU on the local radio station program called Think on These Things (http://www.anglicandioceseja.org/?page_id=11266). Ephena Matthew (Diocesan President of North East Caribbean and Aruba) and I were interviewed by Tony Patel, a distinguished-looking

soft-spoken man with a broadcaster's voice. I noticed when we first met that his hair was long and braided down his back.

When I later spoke with him, I asked him about his children. He mentioned that he had a son who had been missing for over two years. He continued to search for him and had not cut his hair since his son had gone missing. He and his son had always gone to the barber together, and he was not planning on cutting it until he found his son. There was suffering and hope in his eyes. Helping Other People Endure – HOPE.

Alice, Lilian and I visited a number of MU projects in the different deaneries. We visited a Kingston Deanery project called the Parent Place at St. Mary the Virgin Church and Elementary School. The school was run by the local MU branch and was also funded by local government. As a result of the Parenting Program, which was facilitated by MU members, a building was attached to the school called the Parent Place, where parents would meet to support one another and participate in the Parenting Program - a very successful parents support group which encourages stable family relationships.

Lilian and I also visited the Clarendon Deanery where we viewed a Skills Training/Income Generating project which the St. Paul's MU members supported/facilitated. Here I met Sadie

and Kemesha, two young women who were encouraged to think about what items they could produce themselves to sell at local markets. Sadie was making jewelry and Kemesha was crocheting clothing. Kemesha hoped to open

Niagara Quiet Day held at Crieff Hills, Puslinch, ON on Oct. 19, 2019

Animated, intelligent, spiritual, sincere and funny! Our leader at the recent Niagara Quiet Day embodies all these traits. Let us introduce our new Bishop of Niagara, Susan Bell.

Bishop Susan shared her faith journey with over 30 delegates, challenging us to examine common themes of our spiritual lives together. Three sessions wove

On her faith journey, she was exposed to many faith communities including settler churches, United, Roman Catholic, Methodist, evangelical, indigenous, and culminating in the Anglican Church (much to our delight). These experiences gave her the opportunity to articulate her faith in a demonstrative way.

Delegates were then invited to reflect on the following questions:

- What is your foundation for your faith?
- What did you seek out on your own?
- What do you need to seek out now? In her second session, Bishop Susan discussed the importance of joy in our faith. She suggested that God created us to enjoy his whole creation as much as we do working to further his kingdom. Her sources of joy included relationships (especially family), friends, cars as a

door to adventure, movies including *Ghost Town* and *The Mission*, music and the arts. Bishop Susan told us that she believed our creative impulses fulfill us at a very deep level and are important in expressing our faith. This session ended with these reflection questions:

- What gives you joy and delights your soul?
- What challenges you to be your best?
- What feeds your faith?

Bishop Susan ended the day by sharing her love of the poet George Herbert. She expressed that the "core" of her Anglican being is centered in his works. Reading his poem entitled *Love*, Bishop Susan suggested that George Herbert's book of poems was similar to the book of Psalms: filled with every emotion and expression of the human experience. We then ended our sessions with a meditation.

As always, the Eucharist which finished our quiet day was inspiring and heartfelt, especially since it included the enrollment of a new MU member, Bishop Susan Bell. That's keeping the best for last!
