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#### **Notice**

The One Hundred and Thirty-Eighth Session of the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton will convene on Saturday, 5 November 2022, at 8:50 a.m. at Christ Church Cathedral, 150 Church St., Fredericton.

#### **Membership**

The Credentials Committee advises that it is important for those who intend to exercise membership of the Synod confirm that their name appears on either the list of licensed clergy or elected lay delegates and substitutes. **PLEASE REFER TO SECTION B.** Those who feel the lists are in error need to take steps, prior to registration on the day of Synod, to clarify their status. Clergy not listed should contact the Bishop's Secretary in advance of the session. Lay delegates, or lay substitutes replacing a delegate, not listed should assure the completion of the <u>form of Certification of a Synod Delegate</u> prior to attempting to register.

#### Registration

Registration opens at 8:00 a.m. Please register upon arrival at the synod session on Nov. 5 as a quorum will be required to convene the Session.

#### **Convening Circular**

Delegates should become as familiar as possible with the contents of this convening circular prior to the synod session and bring a copy to the session. <u>If lay delegates are unable to attend the session of synod, this circular must be passed to the substitute from the same parish attending in their place.</u> Those who wish to reference the digital version of the circular should download it to a device prior to arriving at the venue, if possible.

#### **Clergy Reports**

Canon Seven 6(b) requires all clergy having a cure of souls, to "deliver to the Bishop at each regular meeting of the Synod a report of the work done in the parish since the previous regular meeting of the Synod." The archbishop requests that the report be a personal assessment of the ministry implemented and of plans for the future which are being considered. This means that report should not be in the form of the annual statistical returns or the rector's annual report to the congregation.

#### **Communicable Disease Mitigation**

This session will follow provincial guidance for living with COVID-19. Delegates are expected to assess and manage their personal risk and respect the risk assessment of other delegates. Please wear masks when entering and leaving the Cathedral or Hall, when moving around inside and when singing. You may remove your mask when sitting or speaking at a microphone. Wash or disinfect your hands often, and cover coughs and sneezes. Most importantly, stay at home if you are sick.

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF A MEMBER OF SYNOD

Lay Delegates to Diocesan Synod elected by parishes have responsibilities to the Diocese and to the parish until they are replaced at a subsequent annual meeting of parishioners according to the Constitution, s. 4. All Clergy licensed in the Diocese are members of Synod.

- (1) Lay delegates, although elected by the parish, are "members" of Diocesan Synod and responsible to it when in session.
- (2) Synod members, when Synod is in session, act and vote as members according to their conscience and Christian understanding.
- (3) Synod members have the responsibility of reporting and explaining the action of Synod in a positive way at the parish level.
- (4) Synod members need to be familiar with the life of the Church at the parish level to guide their discussion at Synod and on committees at Synod, and be familiar with the structures of the Diocese so as to facilitate understanding at the local level.
- (5) Prior to any meeting of Synod, synod delegates will familiarize themselves with the agenda and any material pertaining to the said Synod.
- (6) Synod members should give leadership and accept election and/or appointment to Diocesan committees.
- (7) Synod members shall attend Archdeaconry Greater Chapter meetings when called by the Archdeacon.
- (8) Synod members are expected to promote the work of the Church at the parish, diocesan, and national level, as well as overseas.
- (9) Synod members ought to promote the actions of Synod, once decided upon, whether or not they voted in favour.

#### CANON TWO -- THE BUSINESS OF THE SYNOD

#### PART I - RULES OF ORDER AND PROCEDURE

#### **Definitions**

1 In this Canon

"Chair" means the Bishop or other person presiding at a meeting of the Synod;

#### The Chair

- 2(1) The Chair is responsible for preserving order and decorum at meetings of the Synod by
  - (a) recognizing members who wish to speak and determining the order of speakers,
  - (b) inviting the mover of a motion to present the opening and closing arguments on the question,
  - (c) facilitating discussion and enabling the members to hear and listen to each other,
  - (d) ensuring that all voices are heard and that none dominates,
  - (e) ruling, when necessary, that speeches be limited to a specified time limit,
  - (f) ruling whether proposed procedural motions or amendments to motions are in order, and
  - (g) putting the question to a vote when all views have been sufficiently expressed.
- 2(2) The Chair may request the advice of the Chancellor on questions of order and shall rule on such questions, stating the applicable rule or practice without argument or debate.
- 2(3) Any member may appeal the Chair's ruling on a question of order and the Synod shall decide the appeal without debate.
- 2(4) The resolution referred to in subsection 2(3) is valid without approval of the Bishop or other chair.

#### **Sessional Committees**

- 3(1) The Chair shall appoint for each regular meeting of the Synod a Credentials Committee, an Agenda Committee, a Nominating Committee, a Resolutions Committee and such other sessional committees as are deemed necessary.
- 3(2) The Chair shall appoint for any special meeting of the Synod a Credentials Committee and such other sessional committees as are deemed necessary.
- 3(3) The Chair shall announce the names of the members of sessional committees when the Synod convenes for business.
- 3(4) The Credentials Committee shall
  - (a) register the names of the members in attendance at the meeting,
  - (b) report to the Chair any question about the standing of persons claiming membership, and
  - (c) report to the Chair as to whether there is a quorum.
- 3(5) The Agenda Committee shall propose the agenda for each day of the meeting.
- 3(6) The Nominating Committee shall

<sup>&</sup>quot;member" means a member of the Synod.

- (a) receive nominations from members for the election of representatives to the Provincial and General Synods and to any other position to which the Synod is required to elect, and
- (b) supervise the election process.
- 3(7) Subject to the age qualification in section 12 and to any requirement that a position be filled by a member of the Order of Clergy or a member of the Order of Laity, all members of the Synod and all substitute lay members of the Synod, whether they are present at the Synod or not, are eligible to be nominated for election to the Diocesan Council, as representatives to the Provincial and General Synods, and to any other position to which the Synod is required to elect. 3(8) When two or more persons receive an equal number of votes on a ballot of the Synod for the election of representatives to the Provincial and General Synods or any other position to which the Synod is required to elect, the Diocesan Council shall resolve the tie or ties by ballot at its first meeting after the meeting of the Synod.
- 3(9) Neither the Nominating Committee nor the Chair shall accept a nomination unless the nominee has expressly consented to nomination.
- 3(10) The Resolutions Committee shall receive resolutions from members and prepare them for submission in accordance with guidelines approved by Diocesan Council.

#### **Order and Decorum**

- 4(1) Members are responsible for assisting debate by
  - (a) identifying themselves and addressing all remarks to the Chair,
  - (b) confining their remarks strictly to the motion being considered,
  - (c) stating their positions clearly, succinctly and without repetition, and
  - (d) maintaining an impersonal tone and avoiding personal comments.
- 4(2) A member wishing to speak shall rise and address the Chair.
- 4(3) When two or more members rise at the same time, the Chair shall determine the order in which they shall speak.
- 4(4) A member called to order while speaking shall sit down, unless permitted by the Chair to explain.
- 4(5) A member, if not interrupting a speaker, may at any time request that the motion being debated be read for clarification of the debate.
- 4(6) Subject to subsections (7) and (8), no member shall speak more than once on the same question.
- 4(7) A member who makes a motion may speak a second time to close the debate on the motion.
- 4(8) An address by the Bishop is in order at any time.

#### **Courtesies of the Synod**

5 The Chair may invite a person who is not a member of the Synod to sit with the Synod or to address the Synod but that person shall not participate in debate or vote.

#### **Reports of Committees**

6 Reports of the Diocesan Council, the Finance Committee, the Constitution and Canons Committee and any other committee required to report to the Synod shall be in writing and signed by the Chair of the Council or Committee.

#### **Notices of Motion**

- 7(1) Members may give notices of motion
  - (a) during a meeting of the Synod, for consideration at the next regular meeting of the Synod and, in the absence of the member who gave such a notice, the motion may be made by any other member, and
  - (b) by sending the same to the Secretary of the Synod not less than six weeks before a regular meeting of the Synod.
- 7(2) The Secretary shall cause notices of motion given pursuant to subsection (1) to be printed in the notice of the meeting in the order in which they were given or received.
- 7(3) Members may give notices of motion during a meeting of the Synod at times appointed by the Agenda Committee.
- 7(4) Motions of which notices are given pursuant to subsections (1) and (2) shall be considered in priority to motions of which notices are given pursuant to subsection (3).

#### **Motions**

- 8(1) No motion or amendment is before the Synod unless it is seconded and in writing.
- 8(2) No original motion, except a procedural motion, shall be received without notice unless permitted by the Synod.
- 8(3) No motion that would result in a new expenditure may be considered unless it identifies a proposed source of funding or is qualified as being subject to available funding.
- 8(4) When a motion has been read by the Chair it cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Synod.
- 8(5) When a motion is being considered, no other motion shall be received except
  - (a) to adjourn,
  - (b) to lay it on the table,
  - (c) to consider it clause by clause,
  - (d) to postpone it until a certain time,
  - (e) to postpone it indefinitely,
  - (f) to refer it,
  - (g) to amend it, or
  - (h) that the question be put,

and such motions have precedence in the order named, following a motion to put the question.

- 8(6) No more than one amendment to a proposed amendment of a motion is in order at one time.
- 8(7) Motions to adjourn, to adjourn the debate, or to lay a motion on the table shall be decided without debate.
- 8(8) A motion that the question be put shall be decided without debate and, to be carried, requires the affirmative votes of two-thirds of the members present.

- 8(8.1) The motion referred to in subsection (8) is valid without approval of the Bishop or other Chair.
- 8(9) Debate on a motion to refer shall be restricted to the questions whether to refer and to whom.
- 8(10) When amendments to a motion are proposed, the amendments and the original motion shall be put in the reverse order to that in which they were made.
- 8(11) When the Chair declares that a question is being put, no further debate shall be allowed and no member shall rise.

#### **Voting**

- 9(1) When the votes of the clergy and of the lay members are required to be taken separately under subsection 8(2) of the Constitution or upon any motion to amend the Constitution or to adopt, amend, suspend or repeal a Canon, the question shall be put first to the order of the mover. 9(2) In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall so signify first, and then those who vote in the negative.
- 9(2.1) Notwithstanding subsection (2), at the direction of the Chair or at the request of twenty members, voting on specified business shall be by ballot.
- 9(3) If there is an equality of votes, either of the Synod voting collectively or in the votes of either the clergy or the lay members taken separately, the Chair shall declare the question to have been decided in the negative.
- 9(4) A question, once determined, shall not again be drawn into discussion at the same meeting of the Synod without the permission of the Chair.

#### **Suspension of the Rules of Order**

- 10(1) A motion to suspend a Rule of Order and Procedure shall take precedence over all other motions, shall be decided without debate, and to be carried requires the affirmative votes of two-thirds of the members present.
- 10(2) The motion referred to in subsection (1) is valid without approval of the Bishop or other Chair.

#### **Unprovided Cases**

11 When a question of order is not covered by these Rules, the Chair may refer to Kerr and King's *Procedures for Meetings and Organizations* for guidance.

#### In Memoriam

#### **The Reverend Douglas Barrett**

1950 - 2022

Douglas Barrett was ordained deacon in 1979 and priest in 1980 in his home province of Newfoundland and Labrador. After serving several parishes there, he came to the Diocese of Fredericton in 2003, and served as rector of the Parish of Derby and Blackville. He retired in 2011 to Newfoundland and was subsequently ordained in the Roman Catholic Church in 2017.

#### **Darrel Norman Butler**

1950 - 2021

Darrel Butler was an active Anglican, serving as a member of Synod and on the parish corporations of both St. Peter's and Fredericton. He also served on the diocesan Archives Committee. He worked at Kings Landing for 44 years, designing many of its interpretation and education programs, as well as serving on boards and committees of the local and wider museum community. Darrel's passion was preserving New Brunswick history.

#### The Reverend Eric Caldwell

1928 - 2020

Eric Caldwell was born in Three Mile Plains, Nova Scotia. His first career was with the Bank of Nova Scotia, retiring as manager of the branch in St. Stephen, and during which he served as a layreader. He was ordained in the Diocese of Fredericton as a deacon in 1981 and a priest in 1985. He served in the Parish of St. Andrews and the Parish of St. David and St. Patrick, as well as assisting elsewhere in that deanery.

#### James Jagdesh Chandra

1943 - 2022

James Chandra was born in the village of Port Mourant in Guyana. He immigrated to Canada in 1967 to study at the University of New Brunswick where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Geology, and a Master of Science in Geophysics; and became a citizen in 1973. Besides a career with the New Brunswick government, Jim was very involved with the Parish of St. Margaret's. He also served at the diocesan level with refugee coordination, parish consultation and synod credentials.

#### The Reverend Barry Alan Cohen-Thorley

1944 - 2021

Barry Cohen-Thorley was born in Astley, England, and immigrated to Canada in 1967. After a short career in sales, and completing studies at the Atlantic School of Theology, he was ordained deacon in 1976 and priest exactly one year later. Barry served in the parishes of Musquash, Coldbrook - St. Mary, St. James, Moncton, Newcastle and Nelson, and St. Paul's (Valley).

#### **Gerald Edward Curry**

1932 - 2020

Ted Curry spent his early years in England and Australia. He graduated from the University of Toronto with a Bachelor and, later, a Master of Science in Forestry. He was a Registered

Professional Forester, working first in Ontario and Alberta, before moving to New Brunswick in 1966. He was inducted into the NB Forestry Hall of Fame. After retirement in 1992, Ted served in various ways in support of St. Andrew's church in Miramichi and of the Diocese of Fredericton, including as chair of the Human Resources Committee. The management of St. Andrew's woodlot for many years continued to challenge him and give him pleasure until his death.

#### The Reverend Canon Milton Forrest Dorman

1935 - 2021

Milton Dorman was born in Montreal and initially studied and worked as an artist, writer and associate editor. Following studies at Trinity College, he was ordained in the Diocese of Quebec as a deacon in 1964 and a priest in 1965. Milton served four years in the Magdalen Islands, then moving to New Brunswick, in the parishes of Grand Manan and Lancaster. He was made a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral in 1984. In 1986, he moved to take up priestly and teaching duties in the Diocese of Toronto where he remained into retirement, though he continued to make annual summer visits to Coles Island.

#### The Reverend Canon James Golding

1937 - 2021

Jim Golding was born in Saint John and was led to a life of service and the Anglican Church while attending Rothesay Collegiate School. He went on to study Theology at King's College, Halifax, and was ordained a deacon in 1963 and a priest in 1964. Jim served in the parishes of Stanley and St. James, Saint John, before heading back to RCS (now Rothesay Netherwood School) for a 21-year career as the school chaplain. RNS honoured Jim in 2019 by recognizing him as a Founder. In retirement, he continued as an honorary assistant at St. Paul's church in Rothesay.

#### **James Macgregor Grant**

1929 - 2021

Rory Grant grew up in Rothesay and spent his career with his family's insurance firm. Rory was very involved in St Paul's church in Rothesay, particularly as a layreader, chorister, Sunday School teacher, and member of Synod.

#### Gwen (Savary) MacKnight

1941 - 2020

Gwen MacKnight was born in Digby, Nova Scotia. Her first career was as a court stenographer for the Nova Scotia Department of Justice. In later years she worked as a secretary for several churches, St. Thomas University and eventually became the manager of the Church of England Institute (the diocesan Anglican bookstore) until she retired in 2008. During this time, she often attended Synod, setting up a book room and bringing church orders.

#### **Rod Langis**

1943 - 2022

Rod Langis was born in Moncton and worked many years as a CN Police Officer and then an insurance agent. He was a member of synod with the Parish of Moncton and layreader with the Parish of Hampton.

#### The Right Reverend George Colborne Lemmon

1932 - 2022

George Lemmon was born in Saint John. After several years working in his family's printing business, he was called to the ministry and began his studies at the University of New Brunswick and Wycliffe College, Toronto. Ordained deacon in 1962 and priest in 1963, he served in the parish of Canterbury; Wicklow, Wilmot and Peel; Renforth; Sackville and Dorchester, and Fredericton. He was made a Canon of the Cathedral in 1983 and served as seventh diocesan bishop from 1989 until 2000. George continued ministry after retirement particularly as long-time priest-in-charge in the Parish of Fredericton Junction. A philanthropist, he was instrumental in the establishment of the Crake Foundation in 1976, which continues to support theological students, clergy sabbaticals, and events such as choir school.

#### The Reverend Dale Petley

1958 - 2022

Dale Petley was born in Summerside but grew up in Moncton. A graduate of the University of King's College and Atlantic School of Theology, he was ordained deacon in 1982 and priest in 1983. Dale served in the parishes of Derby and Blackville, Richmond, and Salisbury and Havelock before moving to serve in Oklahoma. Upon his retirement in 2018, he moved back to Moncton. Dale was one of the founding staff of St. Michael's Youth Conference (Atlantic).

#### **Mary Louise Robinson**

1956 - 2022

Mary Robinson was born in Saint John and an engineer by vocation, but she most recently capably served as office administrator for St. John the Evangelist church in Fredericton. She was chair or cochair of the Arrangements Committee for over a decade of diocesan synods and was key in ensuring everything was in place and people were well fed at those sessions.

#### The Reverend Captain Charles Smart

1939 - 2020

Charles Smart was born in East York Township, Ontario. First training with Church Army, he spent 24 years as an evangelist in the dioceses of Toronto, Arctic, Athabasca, Qu'Appelle, Nova Scotia and Fredericton. In the meantime, he received a diploma and then his degree in Theology in 1973. He was ordained a deacon in 1984 and a priest in 1985 in the Diocese of Fredericton. Charlie served as priest in many parishes in the diocese beginning with Kent and finishing active ministry in McAdam. In his retirement he served as interim priest in Campobello and then as an honorary assistant in the Parish of Douglas and Nashwaaksis.

#### The Reverend Canon Thomas Armstrong Smith

1930 - 2022

Thomas Smith was born in Belfast, Ireland, and was ordained in the Irish Diocese of Down as deacon in 1954 and priest in 1955. He first moved to Canada in 1957 and served in the dioceses of Huron and Keewatin, before returning to Ireland for four years. He moved to New Brunswick in 1967 and subsequently served in the parishes of Hampton, St. Mary, York and St. Peter's. Tom served as Diocesan Registrar from 1989 until days before his death, as well as chaplain to the Fredericton hospital and honorary assistant at Christ Church Cathedral.

#### The Reverend Edwin Thompson Spencer

1930 - 2020

Ted Spencer was born in Morden, Manitoba, and received his L.Th. from Trinity College. He was ordained deacon in 1954 and priest in 1955, and then served in the parishes of Musquash, Ludlow and Blissfield, Richmond and St. Margaret's. He also served as Warden of Layreaders for many years and worked for the national church for nine years prior to his retirement.

#### The Reverend Jonathan Springthorpe

1974 - 2022

Jonathan Springthorpe was born in Stockton-on-Tees, England, spending his early years there and in Africa before immigrating to British Columbia with his family at the age of eight. In 2001, Jonathan trained at Taylor College in Saint John with Church Army Canada (Threshold Ministries). After earning a Master's in Theology from Wycliffe College, Toronto, he was ordained a deacon and then priest in 2012. As a cleric, he first served at Emmanuel Church in Richmond Hill, Ontario, and after returning to New Brunswick, in the Parishes of Musquash and St. Mark, the Saint John Vineyard Church and the Westside Anglican Mission. He was rector of the Parish of Lancaster at his death.

#### **Gary Veneau**

1953 - 2022

Gary Veneau was born in Kentville, NS. He worked at the former Brunswick Mines, was a first responder in mine rescue and a member with the New Bandon & Salmon Beach Volunteer Fire Department. Gary was very involved with the Parish of New Bandon, serving as warden and a member of Synod.

#### The Reverend Dr. Russell Lee Whitney

1935 - 2022

Lee Whitney was born in Allentown, Pennsylvania. During his first career as an English professor, he moved to Canada to complete a PhD at both the Pontifical Institute of Medieval Studies and the University of Toronto. After teaching at the University of Toronto for 14 years, Lee and family moved to a farm outside of Sussex in 1977; he and his wife Alice lived there for almost 40 years before moving to Fredericton. Lee was ordained a deacon in 1979 and a priest in 1981 and worked actively as a priest for seven years in the Parish of Johnston. For many years he wrote a weekly column titled "A Letter from Home" for the King's County Record under the pen name Jacob Erdman.

#### John Leighton Williamson

1935 - 2020

John Williamson, of St. Andrews, was a longtime active member of the Parish of St. Andrews, serving as church warden, vestry member and lay delegate to Diocesan Synod. During a long career with the Government of New Brunswick, he helped set up the Provincial Archives and King's Landing Historical Settlement.

The 137<sup>th</sup> Session of the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton was convened in the Sanctuary of Journey Wesleyan Church, Fredericton. Registration of delegates began at 8:00 am.

#### **CALL TO ORDER**

The Right Reverend David Edwards, Bishop of Fredericton, called delegates, guests, and observers to order at 8:50 am by acknowledging that the land on which Synod gathered is the traditional unceded territory of the Wolastoqey people. Motion carried.

#### MILITARY CHAPLAINCY

The Bishop asked the Rev Michael Caines to address Synod and he spoke about the Canadian Armed Forces Chaplaincy.

#### **MORNING PRAYER**

The Rev Rob Salloum and the Rev Barb Haire led the Synod at Morning Prayer.

#### **BISHOP'S CHARGE**

In his charge, the Bishop reminded Synod delegates of the importance of mission. He spoke about recent initiatives large and small across the Diocese where we are impacting our communities. Whether it is knitting hats for babies and making prayer shawls to major projects in the parishes of the Diocese in Grand Bay-Westfield and in Hampton, Anglicans have been making a difference in New Brunswick.

The Bishop called for an intentional response to discipleship with Mission Action Plans. The plans would build on the "Deep Roots" event with Michael Frost and the visit of Canon Phil Potter to the Clergy Conference. The Bishop also called the Diocese to join with the rest of the Anglican Communion in the season of intentional discipleship so that we can come to understand more fully what it means to be a follower of Jesus.

The Bishop laid out his desire for the Diocese to focus on the "cure of souls" in New Brunswick. He wants the Diocese to see the Anglican Church as part of the Kingdom of God and, in our New Brunswick context, this means everyone in the province should be able to access an Anglican congregation locally.

The Bishop screened a YouTube video by Michael Jr about knowing your "why." Your "why" provides the passion to transform what you do. The Bishops "why," his passion, is to see people to come to know Jesus and through Jesus to know God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

The Bishop identified we who follow Jesus as Kingdom agents for change in our villages, towns and cities. Drawing on the Five Marks of Mission as our foundation, we are called to provide both innovative and traditional ministry for people of all ages; to educate followers of Jesus for

mission in their context; and to establish partnerships with other organizations for the good of our province.

The Bishop was clear that mission is critical for the life of the church and the people the church reaches with the Good News because it is through relationship with God through Christ, within Jesus' body the Church, that human beings have a chance of finding wholeness and peace. Let us go out from this Synod determined to share in the mission of God for the good of all.

Copies of the charge were made available at the Synod and will be made available on the Diocesan website after Synod.

#### **DIOCESAN LOGO AND TAGLINE**

Gisele McKnight introduced the new Diocesan logo, "Followers of Jesus sharing hope and help in our communities and beyond," and our new tagline, "Sharing Hope and Help" and noted that Delegates may have seen them in the New Brunswick Anglican already.

#### **SYNOD OFFERING**

The Secretary of Synod announced that a Synod offering would be collected to provide support for youth camperships for Diocesan camping ministries.

#### **BREAK**

The Bishop called for a break and asked members to return in 5 minutes. The Bishop called the Synod back to order at 10:30 am to consider notices of motion.

Motion 137-07 - The Rev Daniel McMullen/ The Rev Rob Montgomery

This motion specifies a narrower age band to the third delegate that parishes may send to Synod to emphasize the youth voice at Synod. An amendment to the motion to change the age from 25 to 30 was defeated.

#### Amendment of the Constitution (tenure of elected lay members of Diocesan Council)

Motion 137-08 - Sandra Craft / The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

The Chancellor advised that this motion would allow any lay member elected from a Greater Chapter to complete his or her term on Diocesan Council even if she or he has ceased to be a member of the Greater Chapter from which they were elected. The rationale is that stability of membership on the Diocesan Council during its two-year term is important.

The motion was carried in a recorded vote by houses

Lay 141 for; 6 against Clergy 63 for; 8 against

#### Amendment of Canon Three (post-election procedure for becoming bishop)

Motion 137-09 - Sandra Craft / The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

This motion would cure misleading language in subsection 6 (1) of our canon on episcopal elections to make it clear that the nominee elected bishop of Fredericton requires confirmation of election by the bishops of the ecclesiastical province of Canada, in most cases consecration, and arguably enthronement in the Cathedral. It makes no change to current practice. "Bishop-elect" is terminology borrowed from the Diocese of Nova Scotia & PEI.

The motion carried by voice vote in both houses.

# Amendment of Canon Four (role of diocesan bishop in managing temporal matters) Motion 137-10 – Sandra Craft / The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

This motion acknowledges the temporal role of the Bishop to supervise and otherwise deal with the status of lay employees and to make the other day-to-day contractual commitments and managerial decisions that go with running the Diocese. The role of the Finance Committee in property matters is defined in Canon Five – Diocesan Business.

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote in both houses.

# <u>Amendment of Canon Four (role of diocesan bishop in requiring police records checks)</u> Motion 137-11 – Sandra Craft / The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

This motion would obligate and empower the bishop to require vulnerable sector checks for all ministerial licence-holders. It would also require licence-holders to report criminal charges.

AMENDMENT 137-11-01 – The Rev Ross Hebb / Deanna Morrison That Motion 137-11 be amended to omit "to renew it at least every third year, and".

The amendment passed on a voice vote.

The motion carried by voice vote in both houses.

#### MIDDAY PRAYERS AND LUNCH

The Dean led Synod in Mid Day prayers, after which the Bishop paused the Session for lunch and asked members to return at 1:00 pm.

#### Amendment of Canon Four and Canon Six (role of archdeacons)

**Motion 137-12** – Sandra Craft / The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

Parish vacancies can be lengthy. This motion would authorize an archdeacon to become involved in parish governance, where desirable, but without becoming a member of the Parish Corporation.

The motion carried by voice vote in both houses.

# Amendment of Canon Five (authority of the assistant secretary and the assistant treasurer of synod)

Motion 137-13 - Sandra Craft/The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

Canon Four allows the Diocesan Council to appoint an Assistant Secretary of the Synod. This motion would permit the Assistant Secretary to perform some of the Secretary's most important duties. Canon Four also allows the Diocesan Council to appoint an Assistant Treasurer. This motion would permit an Assistant Treasurer to sign cheques.

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote in both houses.

#### Amendment of Canon Six (non-incumbents presiding at parish annual meetings)

Motion 137-14 - Sandra Craft/The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

This motion would remove the distinction between the role of a non-Incumbent in presiding at meetings of the parish corporation and the annual parish meeting.

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote in both houses.

#### Amendment of Canon Six (membership of Parish Advisory Committee)

Motion 137-15 - Sandra Craft/The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

This motion would widen the pool of possible appointees to the Parish Advisory Committee (PAC) and removes the restriction that all members of PAC be members of the Parish Corporation.

The motion carried by voice vote in both houses.

# Amendment of Canon Six (preserving liability insurance policies; annual disclosure of special trusts)

Motion 137-16 - Sandra Craft/The Very Rev Geoffrey Hall

This motion would change terminology on the inspection of financial records; it recognizes the importance of retaining insurance policies to respond to changes in "limitation of actions" legislation; and it establishes a requirement for parishes to disclose at parish annual meetings any special direction for trusts for which the parish corporation is trustee.

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote in both houses.

#### Amendment of Canon Six (parish financial signing authorities)

**Motion 137-17 –** Addie Marshall/Sandra Hamilton

This motion would change sub-section 10(2) of Canon Six to permit Parish Corporations to appoint signing authorities in accordance with the requirements of their banking institution and the logistics of their geographic location. Signing authorities could still include any of the Incumbent, the Treasurer or a Warden(s).

Parishes, especially rural parishes, need the flexibility to work with their banking institutions in a manner that works best for both parties, and within the rules and regulations governing those financial institutions and a parish.

This motion also permits a Parish to establish electronic banking protocols to facilitate automated bill payments.

The motion carried by voice vote in both houses.

#### **Cemeteries in Dissolved Parishes**

**Motion 137-18 –** The Rev Bonita LeBlanc/Maxine Fullarton

THAT Diocesan Council develop a policy and procedures for the perpetual care of cemeteries located within dissolved parishes.

Direction on the maintenance of cemeteries in dissolved parishes is unclear. This policy could inform procedures in parish cemeteries and also for columbaria.

The motion carried by voice vote.

#### INTENTIONAL DISCIPLESHIP AND MISSION ACTION PLANS

Shawn Branch provided some history and context on intentional discipleship and shared a video from the Anglican Consultative Council. Synod motion **2017-09 – A Missional People** urged every congregation to do a Lenten study of Michael Frost's **Surprise the World: The Five Habits of Highly Missional People** and follow its call to lead "questionable" lives. The Synod would build on this initiative by accepting the Anglican Communion's challenge to the worldwide church to enter a season of intentional discipleship to lead a Jesus-shaped life led by ministry-focused Diocesan Council teams.

**Motion 137-19** – Shawn Branch / The Rev Christopher Hayes

THAT members of this Synod encourage parishes to continue the momentum begun through *Surprise the World*'s challenge to lead "questionable" lives by urging fellow Anglicans to accept the Anglican Communion's invitation to enter a season of intentional discipleship, until 2025, to strengthen our identity in and mission to New Brunswick communities.

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

Shawn Branch encouraged Synod to respond to the season of Intentional Discipleship by having Parishes develop Mission Action Plans (MAPs). Templates and staff would be made available to assist parishes in the discernment and implementation of the plans.

Motion 137-20 – Shawn Branch / The Rev Dr Sean Davidson THAT this Synod request each parish to discern and develop a Mission Action Plan during 2020 that outlines its mission, discipleship and ministry focus for the season ahead (between 2-5 years as appropriate).

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

#### UNITY

The Rev Leo Martin spoke of the polarization occurring within the Church around the definition of marriage; polarization is antithetical to Christian behaviour. He offered the motion not to reopen a debate, but with hope that we can stand together under the leadership of Jesus Christ and perform the mission set before us. The Rev Paul Ranson noted that a Church united glorifies Jesus Christ; in a Church divided Jesus is not. Jesus Christ gave us a model of reconciliation we should follow.

Motion 137-21 - The Rev Canon Leo Martin/The Rev Paul Ranson THAT as Jesus prayed for the Church to be one, so the Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton commits itself to walk together, in the bonds of love and affection, recognizing diverse opinions on the matter of marriage in the church. We will care for one another and continue to strengthen our commitment to the proclamation of the Gospel and living and loving as Christ.

The motion carried unanimously by voice vote.

Our Bishop sits as a member of the Council of General Synod, participates in the House of Bishops, and attended Lambeth 2022.

# Getting a Motion Before Synod

Synod Jurisdiction: The jurisdiction of the Diocesan Synod is the "government and administration of the temporal affairs of the Church in the Diocese" (Anglican Church Act, s.4(1)). In contrast to the Diocese's "temporal affairs", the spiritual affairs of the diocese are the jurisdiction of its bishop, and matters of "the doctrines of the Church" are the jurisdiction of the General Synod (Declaration of Principles, s.6).

Order of Consideration: [Canon Two, sections 7(4) and 8(2)] Motions will be considered at Synod in the following order:

- 1) Notices given at a preceding Synod for consideration at the current Synod (to be printed in the order given);
- 2) Notices given six weeks before Synod (to be printed in the order received); and
- 3) Notices given at Synod before the deadline set by the Agenda Committee.

Motions of which notices are given under 1) and 2) above shall be considered prior to notices given at Synod under 3).

Making a Motion: All substantive motions are initiated by giving a Notice of Motion by way of the required form. Notices of Motion can be given either before or for a brief time during a Synod.

Before Synod: [Canon Two, sections 7(1)(b) and 7(2)]

Notices of Motion for regular meetings of Synod can be sent to the Resolutions Committee (<u>resolutions@anglican.nb.ca</u>) not less than six weeks before Synod and when appropriate will be printed in the Synod Journal and in the order received.

At Synod: [Canon Two, sections 3(10), 7(1)(a) and 7(3)]

Notices of Motion can be given at a meeting of Synod by delivering the same to the Resolutions Committee before the deadline set by the Agenda Committee. A Notice of Motion can be given for consideration either at the current meeting of Synod or at the next regular meeting of Synod. However, it is preferable to submit motions to the Resolutions in advance and not wait until the day of the Synod.

Procedural Motions: [Canon Two, section 8(5)]

Procedural motions (such as a motion to table, refer or adjourn) may be made without notice and must be disposed of before consideration of the substantive motion before Synod.

Resolutions Committee: [Canon Two, section 3(1), Regulation 2-1 Resolutions Committee Mandate]

The Resolutions Committee does not have authority to veto or refuse a motion, but will seek to ensure that the language reflects the mover's intent and is in clear and coherent language, and the Committee may recommend clarifications and point out potential concerns. It may also suggest consolidation of a proposed motion with other motions received on the same subject.

New Expenditures: [Canon Two, section 8(3)]

Motions proposing new expenditures must either identify a proposed source of funding or be qualified as being made "subject to available funding."

# RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE MANDATE

#### 1 Task

It is the responsibility of the Committee:

- 1(1) To receive, and prepare for debate, motions proposed for the consideration of the Synod;
- 1(2) To ensure that proposed motions contain clear and concise statements of what is intended by the sponsors;
- 1(3) To propose consolidations of motions dealing with the same subject; and
- 1(4) Generally, to ensure that motions do not conflict with the Constitution or Canons, or the regulations, directives or guidelines of the Diocese.

# 2 Resolutions Procedures

- 2(1) All motions not already printed in the Convening Circular, except those of a procedural or courtesy nature, or those that arise in the course of debate, shall be written and submitted to the Secretary for consideration by the Committee before being put to the Synod. (The Secretary will give the notice of motion to the Chair of the Resolutions Committee who will assign it a number and present it as a notice of motion at a time determined by the Agenda Committee.)
- 2(2) The Committee shall not debate the merits of any proposed motion, but will ensure that it contains a clear and concise statement of what is proposed.
- 2(3) Any motion presented to the Committee may be accompanied by an explanatory note setting forth the consideration leading to the proposal. This note will not form part of the motion.
- 2(4) The Committee is authorized to propose consolidations of motions which deal with the same subject, with the understanding that, in doing so, the Committee will consult with the sponsors of the motions.
- 2(5) The sponsors of any motion which is recommended for change by the Committee must be consulted and asked for their agreement to the change(s) proposed.
- 2(6) The Committee will advise the author of any proposed motion it considers to be:
  - a. outside the jurisdiction of the Diocesan Synod;
  - b. unclear or ambiguous;
  - c. inaccurate;
  - d. of local rather than a diocesan character;
  - e. impossible of performance; or
  - f. calculated to be a source of embarrassment to the Church; and propose amendments to the same, where possible, to alleviate such concerns.

# 3 Vote Count Team

- Prior to each regular and special meeting of the Diocesan Synod, the Chair of the Resolutions Committee, in consultation with the Secretary of the Synod, shall select and train a Diocesan Synod Vote Count Team.
- 3(2) The Vote Count Team shall comprise at least six persons.
- 3(3) A member of the Diocesan Synod may be a member of the Vote Count Team.

# **Notices of Motion**

Motion 2022 - 01 -Amendment of Canon Three (timeline flexibility for episcopal election) Susan Jack/David Peer

#### MOVED THAT

**Canon Three - Election and Appointment of Bishops** be amended as follows:

**1(1)** When a vacancy occurs in the See of Fredericton, the Diocesan Council shall summon an electoral meeting of the Diocesan Synod for the election of a Bishop to be held not less than forty-five nor more than ninety days after the vacancy has occurred, at which meeting no business other than such election shall be transacted.

1(2) Notwithstanding sub-section 1(1), in exceptional circumstances the Diocesan Council may summon an electoral meeting of the Diocesan Synod for a date more than ninety days after the vacancy has occurred.

Explanation: Postponement on account of the health emergency of scheduled electoral synods in various Canadian dioceses has highlighted the fact our own episcopal election canon provides no mechanism for altering the 90-day maximum time-line set out in s. 1 of Canon Three – Election and Appointment of Bishops. The addition of subsection 1(2), as proposed in this amendment, would introduce procedural flexibility for exceptional circumstances by allowing the Diocesan Council to lengthen the timeline for the meeting of an electoral synod. Otherwise, the electoral Synod would have no alternative but to convene electronically.

# Motion 2022 - 02 - Amendment of Canon Five (Synod investment policy) Susan Jack/David Peer

#### MOVED THAT

**Canon Five - Diocesan Business** be amended as follows:

1(3) When the Finance Committee invests property, including trust property, in any kind of property, real, personal or mixed, it shall, subject to any express provision of a will or other instrument creating a trust and to such policies and standards as the Synod adopts, exercise the judgement and care that a person of prudence, discretion and intelligence would exercise as a trustee of the property of others.

1(4) Notwithstanding subsection (3), the Finance Committee shall not invest **less than forty per cent** more than sixty per cent of the Synod's general investment fund or of any segregated fund **in fixed income securities** preferred and common shares of corporations.

Explanation: The current language of subsection 1(4) reflects a superseded investment world, where the only available equity investments were corporate shares. Nowadays, investment products resist such a simplistic categorization, and the current language restricts Synod equity investment in a way that is impractical.

The aim of the proposed amendment is to retain the intent of the existing provision (that is, not less than 40% in fixed income) while removing the obsolete restriction on the nature of equity investment.

# Motion 2022 - 03 -Amendment of Canon Six (episcopal role in parish governance) Susan Jack/David Peer

#### **MOVED THAT**

#### **Canon Six - Parish Governance** be amended as follows:

- 1(1) As provided in the Anglican Church Act, 2003, a Parish Corporation comprises the Incumbent together with two Church Wardens and members of the Vestry chosen as provided in section 2.
- 1(2) The Incumbent is the person appointed to that position or shared position in a parish or mission and includes a member of the clergy appointed as Rector.
- 1(3) A person appointed to have charge of a parish but who is not an Incumbent is not a member of the Parish Corporation but is entitled to attend the annual meeting of parishioners and meetings of the Parish Corporation with voice but no vote and, if the meeting so decides, may preside.
- 1(4) Notwithstanding any other provision in this Canon, the Bishop may require an Incumbent, a non-incumbent appointed to have charge of a parish or the Church Wardens, as the case may be, to call a meeting of the Parish Corporation or of the voting members of the parish.
- 1(5) Notwithstanding any other provision in this Canon, when the Bishop is present at a meeting of the Parish Corporation or of the voting members of the parish, the Bishop may preside as chair but has no vote.

Explanation: In ecclesiological understanding a diocesan bishop is the chief pastor of parishes, but in this diocese the bishop has no formal relationship with parish corporations as such. (This is in contrast to territorial archdeacons, who have some canonical role, if they choose to exercise it, in the governance of parishes that are vacant.)

The proposed amendment would grant the diocesan bishop power to summon and, if present, chair meetings either of a parish corporation or of the voting members of a parish.

# Motion 2022 - 04 -Amendment of Canon Six (annual meeting financial statements) Susan Jack/David Peer

#### **MOVED THAT**

**Canon Six - Parish Governance** be amended as follows:

- 2(1) There shall be, not later than the last day of February in each year, an annual meeting of voting members in each parish which shall
  - (a) determine, before nominations are made, the number, being not fewer than six nor more than twelve, of members of the Vestry to be elected,

(d) receive a full and detailed statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of the Parish Corporation for the past financial year, duly **prepared** audited by a **chartered** professional accountant, or **prepared by the Parish Treasurer and reviewed** by two competent persons, and any other information required by the Treasurer of the Synod or by regulation in such form as may be prescribed by regulation,

[etc]

...

- 4(1) Subject to the authority of the Bishop and the Synod, a Parish Corporation shall
  - (a) organize and manage activities and programs in furtherance of Christian life in the parish,

[etc]

(k.1) prepare and submit to the annual meeting of voting members in the parish a full and detailed statement and account of the receipts and expenditures for the past financial year, duly prepared reviewed by a chartered professional accountant, or prepared by the Parish Treasurer and reviewed by two competent persons,

[etc]

Background: By Canon Six a Parish Corporation's annual meeting is to be presented with a statement of parish financials for the previous calendar year. The Canon refers twice to this statement, albeit in slightly different contexts. The original description of such statements was "audited". As it became evident that few parishes had the benefit of, or had financial affairs of such magnitude as to warrant, an actual audit, the language of s. 4(1)(k.1) was changed from "duly audited" to "duly reviewed"; the parallel language in s. 2(1)(d) was overlooked, so that it remained unchanged. In course of rectifying this anomaly, it is proposed now to replace both "audited" and "reviewed" – which can be understood as having a technical meaning -- with "prepared".

# Motion 2022 - 05 -Amendment of Canon Six (parish purchase of land) Susan Jack/David Peer

#### **MOVED THAT**

# **Canon Six - Parish Governance** be amended as follows:

- 4(1) Subject to the authority of the Bishop and the Synod, a Parish Corporation shall
  - (a) organize and manage activities and programs in furtherance of Christian life in the parish,
  - (b) manage the investment of endowment and other funds of the parish and, in so doing, may engage professional assistance and pay reasonable fees therefor,
  - (c) **purchase or** dispose of real property only with the approval of the Bishop and the Finance Committee of the Diocesan Council,
  - (d) manage the properties, revenues and expenditures of the parish, utilizing appropriate financial controls and procedures,
  - (e) employ the lay employees of the parish

[etc]

Explanation: The **Anglican Church Act** gives the Synod power to regulate both parochial acquisition and disposition of real property.

Parish **disposition** of an interest in land is governed already by Canon Six.

While the Act gives the Synod a corresponding power to regulate parish **acquisition** of real property, the Synod does so currently only by policy. The proposed amendment to Canon Six would give canonical status, and corresponding prominence, to this existing policy restriction on acquisition.

The rationale for such regulation is that parish purchase of land would typically be in preparation for development, and the Bishop and Synod would want to be involved at the outset of any such development process, not after a land purchase had occurred already.

Note that the amendment extends only to parish purchase of land. Parish acquisition of land by gift continues unregulated.

#### TREASURER OF SYNOD

# **Mandated Responsibilities:**

The Treasurer is appointed by Diocesan Council and under Section 10(2) of the Constitution is required to:

- a) receive all money belonging to or collected under the authority of the Synod, and disburse the same as the Synod shall direct,
- b) keep careful accounts of all money belonging to or collected and disbursed under the authority of the Synod and present those accounts to the Synod at each regular meeting of the Synod and to the Diocesan Council as it may require,
- transfer all property, books, records, documents and papers relating to its concerns that may
  be in the possession or control of the Treasurer to the successor or other person as the Synod
  may direct.

The Synod Treasurer provides financial information on a regular basis to the Finance Committee and to Diocesan Council. The financial statements for the years ended December 2019, 2020 and 2021 are included in the appendices of the synod convening circular.

#### **Financial Overview:**

The Diocesan financial results are one of the most complex that I have had to report on. We continue to try to streamline and make the financials more transparent and user friendly. Below are three years of financial results that reflect great volatility in the markets. Our financials are impacted by this as we are required to book unrealized market gains and losses. Some would say these are only on paper as they are not recognized by the CRA but an accounting requirement. The risk that this has had on our financials is that our rate of return for investment payouts included these unrealized gains and losses. Below in the financial commentary in 2019 there were unrealized gains which result in larger interest payouts causing excess revenue over expenditures to be negative. In 2020 there were unrealized losses that reduced the interest payouts causing excess revenue over expenditures to have a surplus. The effect of market volatility on the comparison of revenue and expenses has

sometimes appeared counterintuitive, particularly when gains and losses on our investments are not realized. It can lead to the situations observed in 2019 and 2020 when overall financial results and the comparison of revenue and expenses do not align. Effectively, in poor market years interest, dividends and capital gains must be held against loss of market value in our investments and in good market years unrealized capital gains are paid out reducing the Diocesan Synod's operating funds.

The need to reduce risk caused by the market fluctuations was recognized. A review was completed to determine how best to do this. In the fall of the 2021 it was approved to align the definition of income in our rate of return calculations used for interest payouts to align with that of the CRA, being the sum of dividends, interest and realized gains and losses. The adoption of this revenue definition provides a more consistent return with more control over the rate of return that reduces overall risk. Essentially, revenue and expenses should better align going forward.

The Statement of Operations provides the update on the financial performance. The focus should be on the Excess of Revenue over Expenditures. This reflects the results of operations, how well the Synod has managed the financials affairs and stayed within budget. This is where the Synod has more control over the results and especially the alignment of revenue and expenses. Financial management although always critical was especially critical during COVID-19, 2020 and 2021. This was a period of great uncertainty. Revenue was less predictable and at the same time the Synod wanted to provide more support to the Parishes. Overall, I am very pleased with how the Synod weathered this period.

#### **Diocesan Finances:**

2019 – The overall financial results were positive. The Unrealized Investment Gain of \$2.478M less Expenditures over Revenue of -\$1.037M, led to an overall net income of \$1.513M. The loss was mainly due to higher Externally Restricted Disbursements (Externally Restricted Diocesan Trusts, Diocesan, Designated and Special Purpose Funds), higher interest to Externally Restricted Funds and Guaranteed Deposits. The overage on expenditures was somewhat offset by higher Other Contributions and Realized Investment Income. The operating fund incurred a negative variance of \$1.280M before Unrealized investment Gain \$2.478M.

2020 – The overall financial results for 2020 were negative. The Unrealized Investment Loss of \$3.433M offset by Excess Revenue over Expenditures (Income prior to the Unrealized Loss) of \$2.468M led to an overall loss of -\$0.97M. Excess Revenue over Expenditures is due to a combination of higher revenue and lower expenditures. Realized Investment income was higher (locked in year-to-date gains with Investment Manager Change) was offset by lower Shared Ministry (credit for March) and lower Other Contributions. Lowers expenditures were mainly due to the reduced interest payout on Trusts, Funds and Parish Guaranteed Deposits and lower Disbursements from Trusts.

2021- The financial results for 2021 were positive. The unrealized gain on investments of \$1.454, gain on sale of capital asset of \$0.428 and Excess Revenue over Expenditures of \$2.092 led to a net income of \$3.974M. Excess Revenue over Expenditures is due to stable realized investment income, higher other contributions, and good overall expenditure control. Other contributions had several components including receipts of DCIF Funds from dissolved Parishes, set up of Office Fund with funds from the sale of capital assets and strong support for Central Saint John Ministry. Other contributions also include the trust and fund earned on the stable rate of return and this was offset with higher expenditures as interest income was disbursed to cover more of the operating fund.

# **Diocesan Shared Ministry Budget:**

The 2022 Diocesan Shared Ministry focuses on the mission and ministry of the Diocese, in keeping with the diocesan mission statement. The budget includes support to five major areas of ministry: Ministries with Youth 6.3%, Spiritual Development 0.2%, Parish Development and Support 9.8%, Mission 15.5% and Ministry Development and Education 12.7%. Incorporated throughout the various areas of ministry are grants, and contributions to support the Diocesan mission focus totaling \$810,518 or 32% of the total 2022 budget (excluding Parish Interest).

Parish shared ministry support provides 38.4% of the funding, designated or special funds, investment income and various miscellaneous sources provide 57.3% and 4.3% respectively. Direct support to the parishes, or mission and ministry on behalf of the whole diocese is the focus of 88.4% of the budget. Since 2020 the overall shared ministry assessment budget was lowered by \$193.5K. In recognition that Parishes are navigating through tougher financial times a review of the rates was completed and, as a result, there was a reduction in the Parish Support rates for 2021. As well, a review was completed to find areas to reduce our expenditures. Our efforts have been to find efficiencies, streamline processes and focus on value added items to maintain a balanced budget without reducing mission and parish support. Both 2020 and 2021 budgets reflect essentially balanced. The 2022 budget reflects a shortfall of \$75.7K. Additional commitments, support for Parishes and mission were critical. We continue to review and manage finances to maintain a balance budget. The ongoing challenge is to continue identifying and implementing cost savings, such as our successful project to move payroll from ADP and manage it inhouse.

The continued parish support of the Diocesan shared ministry budget is encouraging but lower at 92% in July. With the end of the Wage Subsidy a few additional Parishes are experiencing challenges. Diocesan Council instituted the current approach for parish support of the diocesan ministry budget in 2014. The council lowered rates for 2021 and it appears to be working in accordance with the objective to have a fair, equitable, transparent, and well communicated process that is flexible enough to recognize and accommodate extenuating circumstances. We recognize and acknowledge the continuing challenge of some parishes to contribute and to contribute towards amounts that were previously written off. We thank all parishes for their support to the current budget.

# **Diocesan Support to the Parishes:**

The diocese remains committed to providing support to parishes and finding opportunities for parish leaders and congregations to gain insight, skills and knowledge that will help enhance parish operations and meet the constantly evolving challenges. In 2020 and 2021, Parish Officers Day was cancelled due to COVID-19. The challenges of the last two years emphasized the need to continue to find alternative methods, such as email communication, webinars, to reach out and assist parishes and leaders. The CRA Policy Webinar that was provided in February.

# **Diocesan Youth Camps:**

The youth camps continue to be a major leadership and financial initiative of the diocese. Recognizing the role that these facilities play in shaping the future of young people, the diocese is devoted to providing leadership, capital, and operational support. With that being said, the youth camps continue to be a major focus of financial discussion, in terms of existing operational obligations, funding to ensure long-term growth and viability.

Fundraising efforts are now complete for the Jonathan Young Memorial Amphitheatre. Construction and landscaping are complete. The structure is beautiful and an asset to the camp. It is used regularly to hold music, drama, skits and other events.

#### **Diocesan Financial Administration:**

Financial and administrative resources, systems, and processes continue to be reviewed, not only for the current operations but also the ability of the financial, and human resources to face the challenges of the future needs of the Diocese and support for the Parishes. This is critical as in recent years the Diocese has assumed and provided more financial and administration support especially during COVID-19, such as the processing of the Wage Subsidy. As well, the finance team assumed more responsibility for E-offering and Payroll as these processes transferred inhouse in 2020 and early 2021. Ongoing efforts continue to streamline and make improvements. Review and restructuring within the finance team was completed to ensure that the administrative role and responsibilities were sustainable in the long term and that diocesan priorities continue to be addressed. The addition of the half time position of the Administrative Assistant has alleviated some responsibilities in this area creating the right resource mix.

# **Challenges and Blessings:**

I assumed the role of Synod Treasurer in May 2018. I was challenged by the need to get up to speed quickly and determine priorities in order to focus and manage my time over the many tasks and projects. COVID-19 added another layer to our work. To add to this challenge, our team has experienced several resource changes. Nicole Chouinard, the former Finance and Administrative left our office in August of 2020 as her family moved to Newfoundland. Justin McCoy joined our office in October to fill the Finance and Administrative position. Since then, the tasks of this position have been divided between financial and administrative. Justin covers the financial tasks as the bookkeeper. Unfortunately, the Administrative Assistant position is currently unfilled. Susan Dickie finished September 7th due to family responsibilities.

I am blessed by the leadership and support of Archbishop David Edwards, and respect for his caring guidance and support throughout the Diocese. As Synod Treasurer, I have the pleasure of working closely with him, the finance team, and other coworkers at the Diocese and with so many committee members who provide guidance and are dedicated to making a difference. Your work is valued and appreciated. Lastly, although complex and challenging work, I am thankful and appreciative for this opportunity.

#### PARISH DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

#### Mandate

The Parish Development Officer, working under the direction of the bishop, fulfils a key role as part of the Synod office team through supporting parishioners, congregations, parishes and the diocese to live the 5 Marks of Mission of The Anglican Communion:

- 1. To proclaim the news of the Kingdom;
- 2. To teach, baptize and nurture new believers;
- 3. To respond to human needs by loving service;
- 4. To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation;
- 5. To strive to safeguard creation and to sustain and renew the life of the earth.

The Parish Development Officer will also support and empower the leadership, both lay and ordained, in the diocese to affect the priorities outlined in the Bishop's Charge to Diocesan Synod.

#### In Review

The work of supporting our parishes and leaders took an interesting journey since our last Synod. While many plans and preparations were underway, these too became subject to the whims of COVID-19.

During the pandemic, several opportunities for teaching, discipleship and formation took place online. Where we once believed that our online presence would be a diocesan and parish websites, we have seen many parishes and groups in the diocese step up to the challenge of embracing the technology, while also decreasing our carbon footprint. Book studies, meetings, sermons, topical presentations are just a few ways we've been able to connect.

Coming out of this time, we are seeing the reality that "going back" isn't an option. Many of our parishes are facing challenging times as many individuals have not returned to gatherings, some are still hesitant to get involved and restrictions have limited community engagements that we have been used to.

We are on the cusp of a new era in the diocese – one that will require us to wrestle with how we live out our calling as the Church. Being available to the Holy Spirit's leading will mean that our parishes will continue to thrive in this new era, while recognizing that life and rhythms may look very different. Many parishes adapted during the pandemic to reimagine ways of caring for neighbour and community.

What does our future leadership look like in our parishes? How can our facilities serve our communities? How do we invite people into life-giving community with us?

These are just a few of the questions facing us. While I wish there were simple answers to these and the other questions we will wrestle with, I know that the answers will likely look very different from place to place. It continues to be a privilege to journey alongside so many leaders in our diocese and helping them to live out their faith.

#### DIOCESAN COUNCIL MEMBER COVENANT

Diocesan Council fulfils a senior leadership role in our Diocese functioning as "Synod between Synods". To discharge this responsibility requires a major commitment of time. As members of Council, we have read and understand the following expectations which we will do our best to perform, the Lord being our helper.

# Meetings:

- Diocesan Council Meetings
  - A council member is expected to attend and actively participate in all Diocesan Council meetings (under normal circumstances, this is approximately six Council meetings per year, at locations across the diocese) and contribute to the work required in between meetings.
- Diocesan Council Team and/or Committee Meetings
   A council member is expected to participate as a member of at least one Council team and/or committee, attending meetings, providing leadership as required and being the link to and from Council.
- Greater Chapter Meetings
  - A council member is expected to actively support the Archdeacon in preparing for Greater Chapter meetings, provide leadership as appropriate, and provide information to and gather information from parish clergy and lay leaders. The Greater Chapter is to meet three or four times a year enabling the continuation of the work of Synod and the Diocesan Council throughout the parishes.

#### Preparation and Follow-up:

• A council member is expected to prepare for meetings, taking time to prayerfully review and reflect on issues and proposals to be discussed, as well as ensure all follow-up responsibilities are completed.

#### Conduct:

- A council member is expected to act in the best interests of the Diocesan Synod, in an impartial
  and nonpartisan manner, being personally accountable for his/her own decisions and Council's
  decisions, always seeking to promote understanding of those decisions in one's own
  archdeaconry and across the diocese.
- A council member is expected to be intentional about walking the walk, partnering in living the Marks of Mission each day. The member will seek to share God's blessing with others, eat with people, consciously listen to the Holy Spirit, actively learn about Christ and alert others to God's reign in all work that is attempted.

# CONSTITUTION AND CANONS (STANDING) COMMITTEE / CHANCELLOR / VICE-CHANCELLOR

## Mandate

Under Canon Four, the chancellor and vice-chancellor are appointed by and answerable to the appointing bishop personally. They serve during pleasure. Their responsibility is advising the bishop, and by extension the Synod and its Council, on matters with legal resonance. Only in exceptional circumstances are they involved with the legal concerns of individual parish corporations.

Chancellors are considered the senior layperson in their diocese. The offices of chancellor and vice-chancellor are non-stipendiary.

The chancellor and vice-chancellor are ex officio members of the Synod's Constitution and Canons committee. As provided in Canon Four, the committee is appointed by the Diocesan Council to advise and make recommendations to the bishop, Synod and Council, particularly concerning Synod legislation. Current membership is: David Bell, Clarence Bennett, David Edwards, Geoffrey Hall, Ross Hebb, Terry Hutchinson QC, Dennis Klinck, Siobhan Laskey, David Peer, Barbara Richards, Deirdre Wade QC, Kelly VanBuskirk QC, and Ann Whiteway Brown QC.

Litigation (actual or apprehended) involving the Synod as defendant is dealt with by legal counsel appointed by the Synod's insurer.

# Work

Experience is always suggesting further refinements to legislation, either by way of remedying what is or crafting what should be. We continue to wrestle with the administrative mindset bequeathed to us by the Victorian church, by which parishes are numerous and each is a largely-autonomous corporation. Once a possible change in canon, regulation or policy is identified, draft

language goes through a vetting process often beginning with the Finance, Property of Human Resources committees and then the Constitution and Canons Committee before submission to Diocesan Council and, in the case of canons, ultimately to the Synod itself.

Beyond this, the two diocesan legal officers (chancellor and vice-chancellor) serve day-to-day law-related needs in a variety of contexts:

- Drafting, including policies, regulations and certain of the motions that come before Diocesan Council and Synod
- Property and trust issues
- Interpretation of diocesan legislation
- Personnel matters
- Review of documents
- Counsel generally

During this last year several property and human resources policies have been revised and a possible cemeteries regulation has been developed.

We are fortunate that Vice-Chancellor VanBuskirk has special expertise in employment and human rights law.

In January 2023 Canada's forty diocesan and provincial chancellors will meet in anticipation of for the forthcoming General Synod.

Particular thanks continue to be offered to vice-chancellor VanBuskirk and to ex-chancellors Ronald Stevenson, Charles Ferris and Clyde Spinney. They are consulted often and share the benefit of their very varied experience.

As of 1 January 2022 the chancellor of this diocese has also been serving as chancellor of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, in succession to the irreplaceable Charles Ferris.

# FINANCE (STANDING) COMMITTEE

# Mandate

To manage Diocesan real and personal property; manage Diocesan trusts; exercise Diocesan borrowing functions; approve all Diocesan real estate acquisitions, renovations, disposals or demolitions; manage Diocesan investments, in particular, those diocesan and parish investments placed in the Diocesan Consolidated Investment Fund; advise and direct the Treasurer of the Diocese; assist in the preparation of the Diocesan budget, guide and advise parishes experiencing financial challenges; collaborate with the Human Resources Committee on issues regarding remuneration and benefits; and other matters including property and liability insurance.

# **Highlights**

# **Investment Committee**

The Investment Committee, a sub-committee of Finance, has been re-established and Terms of Reference have been developed. This committee has acquired members who are well versed in the

many nuances of the markets. The committee led the assessment of candidates to manage our investments and they ensured that returns on diocesan investments were optimized. The Investment Committee comprises Scott Fairweather (Chair), Mike Briggs, Susan Jack and ex-officio members Heather Harris-Jones, The Rev. David Peer and Archbishop David Edwards.

# **Property Committee**

The Property Committee is also a sub-committee of Finance. This committee assessed requests from many parishes and brought 59 motions to Finance Committee over the last three years. In addition, they provided regular updates of property issues to the Finance Committee and provided parishes with their expertise as required.

The roles and responsibilities of the Property Committee have been updated and some new members were added to better represent all the archdeaconries of the Diocese. Members include Jim Knight (chair), Mike Briggs, Clare Fracker, The Rev. Bob LeBlanc, The Ven. Rob Marsh, The Rev. Michael O'Hara, The Rev. Steven Scribner and Bill Tracy.

# Diocesan Consolidated Investment Fund (DCIF)

In 2019, markets recovered from the loss in 2018 but still experienced volatility. As a result of the volatility and low interest rates \$5M of the fund was moved into an apartment REIT to reduce the overall risk of our portfolio. The markets did recover with a 10.0% return in 2019 allowing annual interest on DCIF investments of 2.75% and bonus interest of 3.5%. In 2020 the markets were still volatile largely because of the pandemic and the DCIF's return was 0.5% but a payout of 2.75% for the year was approved. The DCIF interest rate for 2021 was also 2.75%. The 2022 interest rate has been set at 3.25%.

Prior to 2021, the bulk of our DCIF investments were managed by Letko Brosseau whose funds were consistently underperforming market benchmarks. As a result, the Investment Committee looked at several investment managers and recommended that the DCIF be moved to RBC's PH&N. This Finance Committee concurred and the transfer of the DCIF commenced in late 2020. As of early 2022 all our investments have been consolidated with PH&N to minimize risk, reduce management fees and ensure regular revenue streams required to pay interest and finance various Diocesan activities. The Finance Committee is pleased with the performance of our funds managed by PH&N so far.

We have been working closely with PH&N, to determine a sustainable rate of return and, as noted in the Treasurer's report, to better predict the realized rate of return for all our investments. We have requested that PH&N plan for an annual return of 4.5% of which 3.5% will be paid out from interest, dividends and net gains on sales in order to fund our budget. The other 1% is reinvested to ensure long-term fund sustainability. This will provide a more consistent rate of return on the DCIF portfolio and provide a more consistent payout to the Parishes while reducing risk to the Diocese.

# **Pandemic Impacts**

With the start of the global pandemic in March 2020, meetings were held bi-weekly to try to stay on top of financial issues across the Diocese. A credit for one month of Shared Ministry and Pension Bonus amounts was provided to parishes. For those parishes that were not yet on e-offering, a 3-month deferral of e-offering fees was offered. The Committee also kept a close eye on the falling markets and potential withdrawals that might be required from the DCIF (which could incur losses).

# **Budgets, Shared Ministry and Grants**

The calculation of Shared Ministry was revised for 2021 to reduce amounts assessed to parishes. A 5% reduction in the Diocesan budget enabled this relief and our Treasurer, Heather Harris-Jones was diligent in meeting the budget.

The table below summarizes the Shared Ministry relief and grants provided for the last several years.

# **Policy Updates**

The Finance Committee provided updates to three Synod policies which Diocesan Council subsequently approved. Generally, the updates provide enhanced governance over Synod and parish assets.

*Policy A-3 Disposition of Real Property and Demolition of Buildings* was updated to include policies regarding the demolition of buildings.

*Policy A-4 Obtaining Financial Assistance* was updated to include Shared Ministry relief as well as grants. Additionally, the guidelines for grants were aligned with those of the Anglican Foundation of Canada.

*Policy A-9: Purchase of Real Property and New Construction and Renovation* was adopted as a new policy, the content of which was previously included in Policy A-3.

# **Final Comments from the Chair:**

The Finance Committee continues to be very busy, often meeting more than once a month as well as during the summer. The Committee members are a very dedicated group who rarely miss a meeting. For this, combined with the collective wisdom and knowledge that they bring to the table, I am grateful.

I am pleased that the Synod office continues to find cost reduction opportunities as well as ways to make the day-to-day operations more robust. The Synod office works hard to manage costs, just as our parishes do. The global pandemic and subsequent period of inflation has brought some unique challenges to all of us, financial challenges being some of them. Be assured that we are always available to work with parishes one-on-one to provide assistance with any financial challenges.

# **HUMAN RESOURCES (STANDING) COMMITTEE**

Current membership: Kathy Asch (Interim Chair), David Edwards, David Peer, Lynda Wood, Perry Cooper, Richard McConnell, Brent Ham, Ben Bourque. The HR committee meets monthly except during the summer months.

# **Cost of Living Assessments and Increases**

2022 was a difficult year to gauge the rise in the cost of living. It was recommended by the committee that a 2.25% increase to the stipend scale would be applied as of January 1, 2022, with the intention of revisiting at the mid-year mark to better judge the increases. At that review, it was determined that an additional 2% should be applied to the stipend scale.

At the same time mid-year mark, a recommendation to increase the mileage reimbursement rate was also made. Gas prices at the time were hovering around \$2.00/L. They have since dropped and a new assessment will have taken place in October.

# **Medical Benefit Transition**

After a lengthy review and quote process, the committee recommended the Diocese move from medical benefit coverage with Manulife, to coverage provided by RBC Insurance. The premium cost was significantly lower, and we would be our own administrators, ensuring much more control over our plans.

Our previous offerings had no ceiling on the yearly premium increases and the plan administrators required us to either cut benefits or deal with the rising costs (some as high as 40% year-over-year). This was the main motivation for the change.

The adoption hasn't been without issues, but the RBC team is determined to smooth out the bumps and ensure everyone receives the exact coverage as before.

# **Triennial Regulation Review**

The committee conducted a review of all regulations that fall under its purview, as per its mandate. Outdated references and terminology, formatting clean-up, and changes in the wording to ensure inclusion were among the recommended changes. The chancellor was brought on board to (greatly) assist in updating these regulations.

# Safe Church Update

Safe Church online training has received an overhaul and has moved on to a much more user-friendly and accessible system. Over the past few years, hundreds have taken the training, both in group settings watching the video, and in the new online system.

Work is currently underway to create an automated database to ensure no new employees/volunteers are missed, as well as generating notifications when retraining is required.

# NOMINATING (STANDING) COMMITTEE

When it was last active, the Nominating Committee consisted of Archbishop David as ex-officio, the Rev. Ann Fairweather as resource, the Ven. Cathy Laskey, the Rev. Walter Williams, Trevor Holder, and myself (Robert Taylor) as Chair. Our last major function was to conduct the election of Provincial and General Synod delegates, and approve Greater Chapter nominations for Diocesan Council, at our 2019 Synod. Between Synods, the expectation has been that this committee would monitor the composition and term limits and membership of committees and teams of Diocesan Council, particularly the Standing Committees of Constitution & Canons, Finance, Human Resources, Nominating, and Property (sub-committee of Finance). There were also five "Teams" and at least seven "Other Committees" to keep track of, most with a defined composition balanced between clergy and lay members and synod staff.

Finding the right people with the skill sets required of the various committees and teams, and establishing clear terms of reference that would minimize overlapping functions, has become increasingly difficult. So, in 2020 a small ad-hoc committee, led by the Rev. David Peer, Synod Secretary; Susan Jack, Lay Chair of Diocesan Council; and myself, undertook a study of the existing structure and ways in which it might be streamlined. We began with a survey of existing Committee and Team Chairs, asking basically what is working for their group and what could be improved and how. The ad-hoc committee recommended a somewhat simplified structure, hopefully to take effect with the new Diocesan Council, to the May 2021 meeting of the Council.

For the Nominating Committee, the result of these recommendations, if implemented, is that we would become a Sessional Committee, active at Synods in establishing elected positions as indicated above, ensuring that chairs of committees and teams are established, and encouraging those chairs to seek out members, not necessarily or only from Diocesan Council, who possess appropriate skill sets to allow the groups to fulfil their various purposes effectively. To quote the Rev. David Peer, "The Diocesan Council needs to work within a formal governance structure that is agile, flexible and focused."

At the 2022 Synod, delegates, as nominated from Greater Chapters, will be elected to the next Provincial Synod, currently planned for 14-15 June 2024. Also, the new Diocesan Council, as elected at Greater Chapter meetings in October, will be introduced.

# PROVINCIAL SYNOD 2021

The 2021 Provincial Synod of the Province of Canada, covering seven Dioceses from Quebec to Newfoundland, convened June 18th and 19th. It was an on-line gathering using the Zoom platform. One of the questions asked on our evaluations was our opinion of virtual versus in-person. While there is no question that virtual is more efficient and less costly, I pointed to a number of precious memories from my two previous Provincial Synods (Quebec and Halifax) to support my hope that future gatherings will return to in-person. We'll see what happens in 2024.

Keynote addresses were given by our Bishop as Metropolitan and Synod Chair, along with Indigenous Archbishop Mark MacDonald and our new Primate, Archbishop Linda Nicholls. Archbishop David pointed to decreased commitment to the institutional Church and the need to prayerfully discern what God intends the Church to be. Archbishop Mark focused upon the wounds opened by the (then) recent discovery of 215 unmarked graves in Kamloops, stressing the need to accept that it has happened and to move forward in a spirit of repentance. Archbishop Linda pointed out several effects of the pandemic, such as reaching out through technology and the rediscovery of the Daily Offices. She showed a worthwhile video that can be found at www.spirit.anglican.ca

Other sessions were led by the Secretary of General Synod (a review of their recent work), along with the Anglican Foundation and PWRDF. The Anglican Foundation showed a 12-minute video which is worth a look at www.anglicanfoundation.org – the very start was the only quote that I recorded in the two days: "In a year when the world said NO – NO to the Peace, NO to kneeling side by side, NO to the common cup....., AFC said YES to....." Projects mentioned included the Say Yes to Kids program and the steeple renewal project of Trinity Church, Saint John. Primate's World Relief focused on the Canadian Government's 6:1 matching of private donations to COVID safety clinics in select countries – donors gave over \$300,000 and the government added \$1.9 million.

There were also group discussions (using Zoom's "breakout rooms") of the General Synod's draft document "Re-Imagining the Anglican Church of Canada During a Triennium of Transition". Business motions adopted concerned several minor canonical changes, and also the financial reports as given by our own Peter Irish.

At each Provincial Synod, each Diocese elects a Clergy or Lay representative (in rotation) to Provincial Council for the next three years. Provincial Council functions between Synods in the same way as our Diocesan Council does. This time the Diocese of Fredericton chose a lay person, and I am honoured to be that person. I thank the Diocese for its confidence in allowing me to represent it at several recent Synods and now on Provincial Council.

# CAMP BROOKWOOD

This was a rebuilding year for Camp Brookwood. Being closed for two years meant momentum was lost and some campers went elsewhere, aged out or found other things to do. Where the camp had averaged 100-110 campers before the pandemic, this summer they had 86 campers over five weeks. The camp made good use of its small staff: Director Emily Sprague, four counsellors, one leader-in-training, an assistant director, a cook and weekly chaplains. Themes this year were Fear Factor, Disney, CSI, Amazing Race and superheroes. Assistant director Morgan Greene came with new ideas gleaned from working at a different camp, which added to the enjoyment. The plan for the final week was to hold a family camp but they had no takers; so, the camp was offered to two local daycare operators, resulting in another 84 children attending that week. They did drop-off and pick-up at the camp and their educators assisted the staff. The children did lots of crafts, swam, learned archery and enjoyed many other activities and it is hoped that some may return as regular campers another summer.

#### CAMP MEDLEY

A lot has happened at Camp Medley over the past few years.

At the beginning of June 2020, the first summer of the Pandemic, we made the difficult decision not to hold overnight camps. While on paper Camp Medley could almost meet provincial requirements to open, the plan was not practical to implement.

Instead, the Camp hired 10 students and used volunteer labour to conduct maintenance and repairs to infrastructure. The summer maintenance period was a unique opportunity to conduct remedial work on the field during the summer while the camp had no programs. The past two years Camp Medley has employed over 20 staff between the ages of 15 -47. This year fifteen employees returned supporting a long-term staff-development plan.

Over the past three years, Camp Medley has focused on improving financial control, overhauling the camp program, and renewing the infrastructure. The camp director and Synod office financial staff have worked together on budgets and identifying aspects of camp operations for attention. The goal has been better financial control, more efficient delivery of programs, and better use of Camp facilities. The financial forecast for Camp Medley continues to improve. Camp Medley was running an annual operating deficit in 2019 and is currently meeting and in some cases exceeding annual financial objectives.

The structure of the program at Camp, and the staff needed to execute it, must align with the demand and the available resources. We were able to run programs the past two years. We based our planning on 250 campers in 2021 and 400 in 2022 with an actual 275 campers in 2021. In 2022 we had 355. This summer we were also able to offer a family camp weekend and host St Michael's Youth Conference. These both were a great blessing and resulted in an additional 113 campers. The first Seniors' retreat will have around 15 in attendance.

The Camp Medley infrastructure is a diocesan resource. The infrastructure is a key contributor to summer programming for youth, but Camp Medley has potential to support other diocesan activities throughout the year. More intensive use of the facility will spread camp expenses over a larger pool of users.

Moving forward the camp is working to become a year around facility. We will have to adjust programming depending on time of year. Camp Medley also needs to support all-age use of the facilities. The bond between Camp Medley and our youth is important and it will continue, but the facility has the potential to support wider demands of faith formation, Christian community development, and programs for all ages and for families.

We have had several weddings, 12-12-12 groups, international students, and two schools. I am very encouraged with the opportunities we have with people using the facility outside of the summer season.

Camp Medley completed the Amphitheater project in 2022. Our main field topsoil and grass is holding up well. Recent changes to switch our heating to an on-demand system and change our lighting system to LED is providing the planned cost savings.

Camp Medley needs a new pool and a new maintenance facility. The current pool is 30 years older than its original design life. Research on replacement pool options has started as we prepare options to replace the facility. Space to store equipment and provide an indoor workspace is sorely needed. Camp Medley is an important Diocesan asset, and the care and upkeep of the infrastructure is very important.

The community supporting Camp Medley has continued to grow since the start of COVID. In the last 2 years alone, over 1449 in-kind hours were donated by people across the province. What the Camp has accomplished over the past three years is due in large part to the work of these volunteers.

I am blessed to be able to serve in this ministry of the dioceses.

# **COMPANION DIOCESE COMMITTEE**

The companion diocese project of a mobile clinic for Ho, Ghana is well under way. The clinic was built at Malley Industries, Dieppe, and was completed in February 2022. Archbishop David Edwards blessed the clinic before it left Malley Industries in March, with several priests and Companion Diocese members present. The vehicle arrived in Ho in early summer, and the equipment is continuing to arrive, with most now in place. The total cost of the project was \$278,000, with the Diocese and Rotary Club of Grand Manan raising \$93,000, and the remainder coming from the Rotary Foundation.

The clinic will go into service this fall in the Volta and Oti regions, bringing quality health care to rural communities that have had no care. Doctors, nurses, and students will accompany the clinic, bringing care to people who cannot go to the city for medical services.

In addition to the mobile clinic project, Dr. Harvey Bass of Florenceville and a colleague donated two eye clinics to the project. This is a great need in Ghana.

Robert Griffin, Archbishop David Edwards, and Dr. Harvey Bass plan to go to Ho, Ghana in early January 2023 to see the clinic in operation.

# **HOSPITAL CHAPLAINCY - SAINT JOHN**

My role as Hospital Chaplain has certainly changed since COVID hit us in March 2020. I went to the Saint John Regional Hospital one morning and my office was gone, the space taken over for screening. After several hours, someone was found who knew where my things had been moved. Patient lists became shorter and shorter until they were almost non-existent. Several months later, lists started to improve, but patient lists are still an issue.

Not everyone who enters the hospital is asked about their religious denomination and if they would like a visit from the chaplain, though these two questions are supposed to be asked of each patient. This is especially true if a patient enters the hospital through the Emergency Department, where, due to the busyness and often grave condition of the patient, the questions are rarely asked. There

is an employee who does follow up twice a week with Anglican patients who have been admitted, but if the patient is asleep or busy when this person comes around, they are missed. There are several units where no follow-up is done (COVID outbreak units, Pediatrics, Transitional units), so more patients are missed.

I am very grateful to clergy who let me know when they have parishioners in the hospital. In the past, I was not permitted to follow-up with these persons unless the request came from an immediate family member, but that restriction has been eased because of COVID.

Despite all these challenges, in 2021 I was able to do 2,070 visits (this number will be down significantly in 2022 due to ongoing COVID outbreaks). My visits were especially appreciated when the hospital was under Red restrictions, as I was generally the only person the patient was able to see other than Horizon staff.

My seven years as chaplain have been rewarding despite the challenges presented by COVID. While relationships are not developed like they are in parish ministry, long-term patients in particular come to look forward to visits from the chaplain. I am grateful that Horizon has allowed this ministry to continue throughout the COVID outbreak, even though there are many restrictions.

# **LAYREADERS**

# Mandate

A layreader is a lay person authorized by the diocesan bishop to officiate at worship services or take a leadership role in certain parts of a service. Layreaders are licensed as in-training or parochial, and assigned to a particular parish, or as diocesan and able to serve in multiple parishes as needed.

# Warden of Layreaders

Cleo Cyr of the Parish of Hammond River, ably served as the diocesan Warden of Layreaders from May 2015 to February 2020 (and as interim beyond that). While in this role, she put in place a new extensive training program, an updated layreader brochure and guide for parish clergy, and organized a team for archdeaconry oversight.

The archbishop and synod are grateful for Cleo's work. A search continues for a new Warden.

# **Statistics**

As of the writing of this report there are 283 active layreaders in the diocese. This is a reduction of 46 since the report to the 2018 Synod, including 18 layreaders, either active or retired, who have died. The category totals are as follows:

Layreaders-in-training: 27 Parochial layreaders: 180 Diocesan layreaders: 76

Layreader Emeritus certificates presented 2018 – 2022: 15

# **Layreader Training Program**

Required courses for layreaders-in-training and continuing education courses for parochial and diocesan layreaders, include:

All course materials, including group facilitator toolkits, are available on the layreader section of the diocesan website. Most are designed to be offered in small group and self-study formats; and include a video presentation of the content by a cleric in the diocese. On-going evaluation of the course content is encouraged.

Group training has not been offered through the pandemic, and self-study registrations have sharply decreased through this time.

# **MOTHERS' UNION**

# Mandate

The Diocese of Fredericton Mothers' Union is part of a worldwide organization of over 4 million members in 84 countries. Our vision is a world where everyone prospers. We actively pursue this vision through prayer and action, helping to build confident people and resilient communities. Our movement seeks to bring about justice, challenge prejudice and advocate change. We aim to: encourage parents in their role to develop the faith of their children; maintain a worldwide fellowship of Christians united in prayer, worship and service; promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children; help those whose family life has met with adversity; promote and support married life.

In New Brunswick, we currently have 95 members in good standing in 8 branches. This is a decline from 106 in 2021 and 117 in 2020. This is in part due to the pandemic as well as the ageing of our members. All branches function independently to meet the needs of their respective congregations and individuals in their communities. We follow the MULOA model which stands for Mothers' Union Listening Observing and Acting. Our Diocesan Council gives support to our 8 branches, plans Diocesan events, and works to maintain relationships and communication with the Mothers' Union Canadian Council, as well as Mary Sumner House, which is our international headquarters in London, England.

# **Current Happenings**

Branch Level: As with other organizations within our Diocese, we struggled to move forward as the pandemic shut down all of our activities in both church and community. Some branches were not able to meet at all while others connected with a combination of Zoom, in-person and outdoor meetings. It appears that some of our groups will hold hybrid meetings in the future, which are actually more inclusive to all our members. We look forward to resuming our outreach work in the near future.

Diocesan Level: Our tradition is to gather every spring for a group Rally. We meet to keep our members informed, and to worship and learn together while enjoying a day of fellowship. Our Rally was cancelled in 2020, but on September 18, 2021 we hosted a Mini-Rally for 34 participants at Camp Medley with the theme "Reconnect and Reignite". At this gathering it was recognized that we need to focus on two very important areas: working to stop gender-based violence and ensuring that climate change is a priority in all our decision-making. These issues disproportionately affect women, children and the most vulnerable in countries all over the world. On April 30, 2022 we held our Rally at St. Mary and St. Bartholomew's Church in Saint John as a hybrid event. The 36 attendees were overjoyed to be together again, reflecting on and learning about "Tranformation", our theme for the day.

National Level and Worldwide Leadership: The Diocese of NS and PEI is chairing the Canadian Council from 2021-2024, with Mary Stone as President. Our National Conference, which was supposed to be held in 2020, was deferred to 2021 as a Zoom event. We hope to hold our Biennial Conference as a hybrid event on November 18-19, 2022.

Kathleen Snow continues to serve as our Worldwide Trustee for Zone B and chairs the Development Committee, which oversees all of the project work and programs worldwide. She also

sits on the IT and Data Committee and the Worldwide Parent Steering Committee. Mary Sumner House found itself in dire financial straits when fundraising efforts were curtailed due to the pandemic. An urgent Worldwide Special Appeal was launched in April 2020. It succeeded in putting us back on more secure footing as members sent funds to keep our organization functioning so that our development projects could continue fulfilling their vital roles to our members.

# THE NEW BRUNSWICK ANGLICAN

# **Subscriptions**

In 2018, the Anglican Church of Canada launched a country-wide project to update the subscription lists of every diocesan paper. There was a belief that the subscription lists were out of date, and that belief proved correct. The method chosen to update the subscription lists was an Op-In program, where readers had to contact the ACC in order to keep receiving the paper. That meant abandoning the lists and starting from zero.

For those thousands who did want the papers to continue, their emails and calls completely overwhelmed the system set up to receive them. It took far longer than anticipated to complete this project. This exercise, though necessary, had startling results. It seems most of our papers were being thrown away upon receipt or mailed to people who had passed on.

For comparisons sake, 5,321 copies of the New Brunswick Anglican were mailed out in January 2018 — before the exercise began. In September 2021, 1,888 NB Anglican newspapers were mailed, representing a subscriber reduction of about 70 per cent. This is not unique to our diocese. Across Canada, diocesan newspapers, including the Anglican Journal, are mailing about two-thirds fewer papers than they did in 2018.

The good news is our press costs have dropped dramatically. As well, there is the environmental benefit of less newsprint being used. And we have 1,888 subscribers to the NB Anglican who want the paper because they opted-in to continue receiving it. In the past year, that number has remained quite steady.

# **Print Copies**

There has been a slow but steady focus away from print copies of the paper to online-only. This was slowed somewhat by lower print costs and the pandemic. In fact, the newly elected Primate, Linda Nicholls, noted that in the depths of COVID with churches closed, the printed paper played an important role in keeping people informed and helping them feel less isolated.

Anglican editors were told at their 2022 conference that there is a print budget in place for the Anglican Journal for the next four years. However, at some point, the Anglican Journal will likely cease print publication, which would make printing a diocesan paper very difficult, since the diocesan papers are printed, folded and mailed with the Anglican Journal.

To help share all the diocesan papers more widely online, the national church has built a website called Anglican News Canada, where readers can find their own and other diocesan papers. This is a work in progress, and we expect the NB Anglican will appear on this website early in the new year. In the meantime, you can check out the papers already there, and bookmark it for our arrival in a

few months. Our paper will still appear on our own website as usual. The website: <a href="https://anglicannews.ca/">https://anglicannews.ca/</a>.

# PENNIES AND SPARROWS (Central Saint John Community Ministry)



Over the last year we have seen a lot of change in the city of Saint John. While there has been a steady stream of construction and new developments, there is also a growing homeless population, increased drug use, more violence and more people dying from overdoses. Against this backdrop, it's not surprising that our greatest recent challenge was running an overnight emergency out of the cold shelter. We are deeply grateful to the many volunteers who allowed this shelter to run, along with our M.L.A.,

Arlene Dunn, who helped us get the needed materials. Our experience taught us that a much greater response to the homelessness crisis in our city is necessary. For a more detailed reflections on the subject, we recommend that you check out our blog post on penniesandsparrows.com entitled "Can Churches Double as Homeless Shelters?"

We are currently involved in conversations with other churches, non-profit organizations, and city representatives to have a more complete solution to our homeless crisis this upcoming winter. We also have been offering an afternoon drop-in program 3 days a week to continue to support this vulnerable population in partnership with Stone Church. We are grateful for funding from the Diocese to be able to support this mission.

Our English Language classes and English Language Bible studies have become popular ways for newcomers to connect, and learn. For the first time this summer we offered a weeklong English Language summer camp for children of newcomers. Thanks to some amazing volunteers the week was a great success with 20 - mostly Ukrainian - kids attending. It was very moving to see them play and interact and have fun after all they have been through.

We have received some federal funding through the New Horizons for Seniors program to offer a monthly seniors event. This program is a fun social time for seniors who have been increasingly isolated over the last couple of years. We provide musical entertainment, snacks, and guest speakers who offer instruction on a variety of topics including: Dementia, Elder Abuse, Stroke Prevention, Blood Pressure, Diabetes, Seniors Exercising, Healthy Eating, and Mental Health.

We work closely with the Waterloo Village Neighbourhood Association which helps us to connect with the non-profits in our area. Together, we recently installed an outdoor food pantry built by the Saint John Tool Library to provide the community with around the clock food access. We also host monthly meetings with the WV Association where organizations have the opportunity to share updates and resources. We have been using these connections to teach kids about community development - both through our Kids Lead program and with the grade 8 class at Samuel de Champlain school.

Our Emmaus Way Teams have provided support to over 9 individuals and families. These teams of volunteers surround people in unstable circumstances and commit to walking with them for a year to help them get through a difficult time. We recently started a team in Fredericton around a refugee family. These teams have also supported single mothers, people with health concerns, and people struggling with addictions.

We are excited to have Miriam Westin now working with us part-time. Miriam will be heading up our Monday drop-in program and will be teaching a beginners English class.

As we've gone in and out of lockdowns, navigating our way through a myriad of rules and restrictions we have managed to support our neighbours in the community through our various programs and connections. We are thankful for all the partners and partner organizations we've had the honour of working with. We thank the Diocese of Fredericton for giving us the support and freedom to do this work and the church congregations that keep encouraging us. We also give our love and appreciation to Stone Church for providing us with the space to do our ministry and the resources to make this work a joy.

We remain especially grateful to those who have contributed to our ministry through volunteering, prayer, and financial giving. As you read this report, may you claim the work that we do as your own. After all, none of this would have been possible without you. Thank you again for all the support that you have given us this past year.

# PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND

As there is currently no PWRDF diocesan representative, included here are sections of the report from the President of the Board of PWRDF.

It would be easy to begin a report covering a period like 2021/2022 with a litany of all the difficulties that COVID brought on. It is true that in the past year, PWRDF board, staff and our many volunteers continued to meet virtually for the most part. While this was not always ideal, we did manage to stay connected and do the important work of PWRDF, often with less cost to our organization. We are grateful for modern communications and the amazing opportunities it offers for working together and collaboration, and as a result I have much to report and many to thank.

Our ability to carry out our important work of providing relief and development to the vulnerable in Canada and around the world is strengthened by the staff's skill at engaging and collaborating with supporters, partners and other funders, not to mention our supporters' willingness to come together and to respond with compassion and generosity.

Our Programs and Partnerships team reports that we have 80 projects in 33 countries this year totalling nearly 7 million dollars. Humanitarian relief projects represent the largest component where assistance and support is offered to victims of natural disasters and conflict. Health projects follow. In this past year, we have twice as many projects with Indigenous partners.

Here are some highlights.

The Canadian government granted an extension of our All Mothers and Children Count program in order to put in place effective covid responses in 4 countries in sub–Saharan Africa and maintain the previous gains that were made in maternal and child health in those communities,

PWRDF membership in the Canadian Foodgrains Bank enabled us to participate in the Humanitarian Coalition's appeal to end hunger where every dollar raised was doubled by the Government of Canada. This enhanced our ability to address the needs of vulnerable communities including small landholding farmers in northern Kenya, and South Sudan.

Our response to the war in Ukraine is now over \$1 Million. These funds are being distributed quickly and efficiently to agencies helping people whose lives have been disrupted by the war, those fleeing Ukraine and those left behind enduring hardships. Recognizing that conflict exists in other places, PWRDF withdrew funds from our investments to support those victimized by other wars in Myanmar, Iraq, Ethiopia, and Syria.

Our partner in Mozambique installed 50 more solar suitcases as part of last year's Light for Every Birth project. These installations enable safe births and a healthier work environment for health workers. As this project was impacted by a cyclone, further funds were distributed to ensure a safe completion of this project. This appeal was very generously supported by Canadians, including a very generous match of \$100,000 from one of our donors.

Our ability to respond to overseas emergencies has been amplified because of our strategic partnership with the CFGB which is in turn part of the Humanitarian Coalition. Presently, any donations for PWRDF's Pakistan appeal, for example, will be matched by the Canadian Government until Sept 28.

As an organization, PWRDF has always been based on partnering, on mutual support, and on implementing a vision that sees the difficulties the world faces as opportunities to promote healing, justice and reconciliation. This year has seen how successful this approach can be. Partnering with a range of individuals and agencies, by linking volunteers with staff, and by deepening our relations with partners in Canada and overseas, we have managed to multiply the impact of our humanitarian efforts many times.

In response to the calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, it needs to be noted that the revelations of unmarked graves and the role churches have played in Residential school, have heightened the need for PWRDF to become more intentional in building relationships with Indigenous partners. In 2021 a new Indigenous responsive granting program was launched to fund Indigenous-led priorities in the fields of community health, safe water, youth engagement and climate action. Guided by an Indigenous Programs Advisory Committee, staff and Indigenous leaders work together to determine where the need is the greatest and respond to community needs.

Staff and the members of PWRDF – Youth Council Members, Diocesan Representatives and Board Members and Honourary Associates – are working closely to ensure sustainability and the important work of PWRDF and our partners. All of the financial donations to PWRDF – legacy giving, major gifts, monthly giving and so much more play key roles in ensuring our work can continue to shore up a solid financial base and as large institutional funding becomes scarcer.

At our July Board meeting, the Board was encouraged to hear how parishes, local supporters and foundations had brought in over \$5 million dollars, an increase of 15% from what PWRDF was receiving in the years prior to the pandemic. And this all in a year when individuals and communities in Canada were struggling. This has allowed PWRDF to continue to respond to emergencies in Canada and around the world, and offer steady, reliable support to our program partners who are working in such challenging conditions. We are so grateful.

The Investment committee completed its survey of different fund management companies and selected one they consider appropriate for our needs. Our investments are in ethical securities that

make a positive impact and are doing well in an uneasy market. One good example of this kind of investment is Raven Capital, an indigenous led company that invests capital in indigenous entrepreneurs giving them a head start in getting their businesses off the ground.

The Governance and Audit and Risk Management committees are reviewing and updating policies, terms of reference, and managing risks as PWRDF updates its procedures and guidelines on the Prevention of Sexual Exploitation, Abuse and Harassment (PSEAH). Both the PSEAH and the Anti-Racism work are essential components of our vision for a world that is truly just, healthy and peaceful. PWRDF has endorsed Cooperation Canada's Anti-Racism Cooperation Framework.

Our present Strategic Plan ends in 2024 and our Strategic Plan Working Group, along with staff, are starting to consider how best to tackle our next plan. A name change for PWRDF is on the table. Conversations with staff, supporters and other volunteers will be happening soon so that we can determine how best to continue the life affirming work of PWRDF.

I want to give a special shout out and thank you to PWRDF Diocesan Representatives, parish representatives and our many, many volunteers who have continued their support for PWRDF in this past year and in this pandemic period. In the midst of so many challenges, churches not meeting in person, events cancelled, our volunteers have continued to find ways to support us through phone calls, zoom calls, mailing resources and promoting PWRDF in the parishes and communities of our Anglican Dioceses. Church members came together for all manner of fundraisers including and most recently for Ukraine. Many thanks to all the participants and their supporters of the Wild Ride as they exercise their creativity, dedication and compassion for refugees or internally displaced persons in so many different ways- walking, cycling, roller blading, baking, reading, knitting, crocheting, swimming, kayaking, dancing and singing in support of PWRDF.

I am also encouraged that over this past year and indeed over this pandemic time, there have been regular moments for us to come together, Praying with PWRDF. Everyone is welcome to join us online every second Thursday.

Partnering, careful listening, and mutual respect have been the values that have made it possible for PWRDF to continue working through pandemics, climate catastrophes, and through wars and rumours of wars. And that is because you, our base, would have it no other way. A huge and ongoing thank you to all, representatives of the faith-based communities that brought our organization into being some 64 years ago and who continue to shape and mold PWRDF today. Thank you for engaging, promoting and working together towards a world that is truly just, healthy and at peace.

# ROTHESAY NETHERWOOD SCHOOL CHAPLAINCY

Just like every ministry in the Diocese, the past few years at RNS have been an adventure.

One of my key responsibilities has been to guide our Chapel program: as the entire school gathers at the start of the day with a time of hymns, readings from Scripture, prayer, reflections from me, and presentations from various groups on topics relevant to our school. Fitting all of this into 20 minutes can be an adventure on a normal day. But as we know, these have not been normal days.

One of the most pressing challenges has been maintaining our Chapel program during the pandemic. In March 2020 we rapidly moved from a-five-day-a-week, full-school-in-one-room

practice to a once-a-week, online format. Along with the various ups and downs in cases and procedures since, we have explored all sorts of arrangements, but thankfully we have been gradually returning to our pre-COVID practice of gathering again each school day as a whole community, which was finally possible in the Spring of 2022.

In addition to our regular Chapel Program, I have also been facilitating our Chapel Speech tradition, where each Grade 12 takes one day in Chapel to offer a 5-7 minute speech on something that they believe to be true. From early on, I am there to guide them through the process, to help them refine their Speech, as well as to offer a personal prayer afterwards for each of them. I consider it a privilege to walk with them through this important milestone.

I also guide the major community services of our school, including our Opening and Closing Chapel services that bookend our year, and our annual Lessons & Carols service, which we have held both in person and online when restrictions made it impossible to do so.

Recently, my role as Chaplain has been connected to the RNS Wellness Centre, working closely with the school nurses, guidance counsellor, and others to help support both individuals and the overall school culture. Our offices are now all in one location to help facilitate this team approach.

RNS is certainly a unique ministry opportunity, with a very diverse student body and faculty represented. In it, I have striven to maintain the balance between upholding the traditions of our Chapel program and my own Christian faith and witness on the one hand, alongside my role in defending the integrity, dignity, and wellbeing of everyone, working to make sure that every member of our school feels welcome, valued, and at home.

## SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT TEAM

#### Mandate

The Spiritual Development Team's mandate is to encourage and support the ministry groups assigned to our cluster and to organize and/or promote special spiritual development (formation) initiatives, particularly working with the diocesan Parish Development Officer.

This report is to highlight activities since the last session of Diocesan Synod. The team met fairly regularly through 2020 and 2021 but, due to the chair's negligence, not through 2022. Some work continued directly with Shawn Branch, PDO.

# **Prayer Initiative**

As its priority, the team focussed on developing and promoting opportunities aimed at increasing the understanding and practice of prayer among Anglicans in the diocese.

- Diocesan prayer retreats were held at Villa Madonna or as online gatherings Lent and Advent 2019, with the Rev. Dr. John Paul Westin leading; Lent and Advent 2020, with Bishop David; and Advent 2021 and Lent 2022 with the Rev. Jasmine Chandra.
- The book Liturgy of the Ordinary, by Tish Harrison Warren, was recommended for parish 2020 Lenten studies; 250 books were ordered. Focusing on the prayer discipline of memorizing Scripture for Lent 2021, the recommended book was Hide This in Your Heart by Michael Frost and Joseph Graham Hill; 200 copies were distributed within the diocese. In 2022, considering how many were feeling, the recommended book was Practicing Lament by Rebekah Eklund; 60 copies were distributed (additional copies are still available from the office).
- Thy Kingdom Come, the Archbishop of Canterbury's global call to prayer from Ascension to Pentecost each year, was promoted in the diocese, with resources made available.
- A prayer resource inventory is maintained on the diocesan website.
- The Rev. Debbie Edmondson continues as diocesan representative for the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer.

# **Spiritual Formation Initiatives**

The team also seeks to encourage personal and parish spiritual growth through initiatives undertaken or supported.

- For Lent 2019, a resource was developed by the team based on further exploration of the missional habits from Surprise the World, with an emphasis on sharing and prayer.
- From June 2020 through September 2021, the team and invited persons provided a series of articles on the Arusha Call to Discipleship for the NB Anglican. These can be found on the last page of the noted editions.
- A card/bookmark was created to encourage a personal rhythm for Christian formation, through: Love, Bless, Grow, Serve, Go, as well as the Five Marks of Mission. These were initially distributed to parishes in 2021 and a second printing was made this year, with copies available to be distributed at the synod session.
- As of 2021, the team is promoting the "difference" course, a program of the Archbishop of Canterbury's Reconciling Leaders Network, including offering an online session in the spring and fall of 2021. It is expected to be offered again this fall.

# Bishop's Pilgrimage

After two years of postponement due to the pandemic, the final leg of Archbishop David's diocesan pilgrimage, through the Fredericton Archdeaconry, took place May 21 – June 5 this year. Many thanks to Trevor Fotheringham, route coordinator and pilgrimage companion, for all his time

researching routes and walking alongside David. The archbishop's blog of all his journeys is available at https://nb.anglican.ca/the-bishop/bishops-pilgrimage.

# Membership

Finally, I want to thank the members of the Team for their dedication to encouraging Christian formation within our Diocese: Shawn Branch, Bill Chilton, the Rev. Debbie Edmondson, Trevor Fotheringham, the Rev. Chris Hayes, Lynn Kristoffersen, the Rev. Chris McMullen and Cheryl Young. We were sorry to say goodbye to the Rev. Dr. John Paul Westin when he transitioned to prison ministry at the start of 2020.

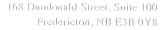


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# **Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report**

To the Members of The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton

The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

# Conclusion

Based on our review nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton as at December 31, 2019, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

# 1. Nature of operations

The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton represents the administrative and episcopal head of the Anglican Church of Canada operations in New Brunswick. The organization is a registered charity and is exempt from income tax by virtue of paragraph 149(1) of the Income Tax Act.

# 2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The significant accounting policies are detailed as follows:

(a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of balances held in bank accounts and investment cash accounts with financial institutions.

# (b) Fund accounting

The organization follows the fund basis of accounting which provides for separate groups of accounts to ensure accountability for restricted assets. The funds established by the organization are as follows:

Operating fund reports general activities related to the unrestricted and internally restricted funds. Internally restricted funds include special purpose funds and designated funds reserved for future expenses. Internally designated funds earned interest income based on the closing balance at a rate of 6.5% (2018 - 3.5%).

Capital assets fund reports the assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses related to capital assets.

**Externally restricted funds** reports activities related to amounts where the donation and related investment income is restricted on usage. There are four separate funds including:

- *Diocesan trusts* have been established through estate bequests and are generally limited to the use of earnings only. Interest earnings are based on the annual rate of return of the overall performance of the investment portfolio [2019 10%; 2018 (3.4%)]. No earnings are generated in years with a negative rate of return. Earnings in excess of the restricted capital are distributed as per the terms of each individual trust agreement.
- *Diocesan funds* have been established through estate bequests and other means and may not be limited to the use of earnings only. Interest earnings is calculated on the closing balance at a rate of 6.5% (2018 3.5%). Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.
- *Designated funds* have been established through donations, bequests, parish assessments, and interest from Diocesan trusts and Diocesan funds. Interest earnings is calculated on the closing balance at a rate of 6.5% (2018 3.5%). Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.
- *Special purpose* funds have been established through donations for a specified purpose. Interest income is not earned on these funds. Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.

# 2. Significant accounting policies, continued

# (c) Revenue recognition

The organization follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions to its restricted funds. Contributions to the restricted funds are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Unrestricted contributions and revenue from shared ministry and parish assessments are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Contributions restricted for the purpose of capital assets are deferred and amortized into revenue at a rate corresponding to the amortization rate for the related capital assets.

Investment income includes dividends, interest income, foreign exchange, and realized investment gains and losses. Dividend, interest and foreign exchange income is recognized when the right to receive payment is established, net of management fees and transaction costs. Unrealized investment gains and losses reflect the change in the fair market value of the investments at year end and are recognized in the Operating Fund.

#### (d) Investments

Investments are reported at fair value using quoted market prices.

### (e) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined using the average cost method.

# (f) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. The organization provides for amortization using the straight-line method at rates designed to amortize the cost of the capital assets over their estimated useful lives. One half of the year's amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition. No amortization is recorded in the year of disposal. The annual amortization rates are as follows:

Buildings Furniture and fixtures 40 years straight-line 5 years straight-line

## (g) Contributed services

Volunteers contribute time to assist the organization in carrying out its mandate. While these services benefit the organization considerably, a reasonable estimate of their amount and fair value cannot be made and, accordingly, these contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

# 2. Significant accounting policies, continued

#### (h) Post retirement benefits

The Diocese and its employees participate in a multi-employer contributory defined benefit pension plan (the General Synod Pension Plan of the Anglican Church of Canada). The Diocese also participates in the national Employers Group Benefits Plan (Retirees) which is a defined benefits plan for retired clergy. Both plans are owned and managed by The General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada. The Diocese is only responsible for annual contributions.

In 2019, the pension plan expense for the Diocese office and administrative staff was \$76,511 (2018 - \$66,457). The current year retired clergy benefits plan expense under the administration of the national office was \$63,814 (2018 - \$94,466).

#### (i) Financial instruments

The organization initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions. The company subsequently measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for securities quoted in an active market, which are subsequently measured at fair value.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, parish receivables, and other receivables, advances to Camp Medley, and parish loans. Financial assets measured at fair market value include investments. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include payables and loan payable.

#### (i) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

# 7. Camp Medley - Related party

Camp Medley is a Christian youth program offered in New Brunswick that provides residential camping and Christian youth leadership development. The organization is a registered charity and is exempt from income tax by virtue of paragraph 149(1) of the Income Tax Act.

The Diocese owns the land and buildings on the property known as Camp Medley and appoints the director who oversees the day to day operations. The Diocese, in this capacity, controls this organization. At December 31, 2019 Camp Medley owes the Diocese \$110,816 (2018 - \$77,343). This liability is non-interest bearing with no fixed terms of repayment.

The financial statements of Camp Medley have not been consolidated in the Diocese's financial statements. An unaudited financial summary of Camp Medley as at December 31, 2019 is as follows:

# 8. Guaranteed deposits

The organization has investment agreements with individual parishes and individual clergy members that guarantee the principal amount invested plus any interest income reinvested. The asset and liability associated with these agreements are recorded as guaranteed deposits in the operating fund.

For the parishes, interest income is paid semi-annually with an additional annual interest bonus, both payable at the discretion of the organization. In 2019, interest was paid at a rate of 6.5% (2018 - 3.5%).

For the clergy members, interest was paid monthly based on the closing balance at a rate of 4.5% (2018 - 4.5%).

#### 14. Guarantees

The Diocese has guaranteed loans to parishes totaling \$1,069,057, including \$195,295 from The Anglican Foundation of Canada, \$707,766 from other parishes, and \$165,996 from the Bank of Nova Scotia.

The Diocese has guaranteed loans to parishes from The Anglican Foundation of Canada totaling \$195,295 as follows:

- \$100,000 for Parish of the Nerepis and Saint John
- \$ 72,470 for St. John the Evangelist Church
- \$ 20,606 for St. Mark's Church
- \$ 2,219 for St. Philip's Church

The Diocese has guaranteed inter parish loans totaling \$707,766 as follows:

\$166,287 to the Parish of the Nerepis and St. John from the Parish of Fredericton

\$156,563 to the Parish of St. Marks from the Parish of Sussex

\$131,544 to the Parish of St. Mark (Stone Church) from the Parish of Saint John (Trinity)

\$124,026 to the Parish of St. George from the Parish of Sussex

\$114,085 to the Parish of Quispamsis from the Parish of Sussex

\$ 15,261 to the Parish of New Bandon from the Parish of Sussex

The Diocese has guaranteed the debt of the Parish of the Nerepis and St. John to the Bank of Nova Scotia to a maximum of \$165,996.

# 15. Lease commitments

Certain land and buildings that were part of the original school property have been leased to the Rothesay Netherwood School at a nominal rental of \$1 per year to December 31, 2100.

In 2016, the Diocese entered into an agreement with Partners for Youth Inc. to operate a facility for homeless youth. The property is leased to Partners for Youth Inc. at a nominal rental of \$1 per year.

# 16. Financial instruments

# (a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a transaction will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. The organization's main credit risks relate to its accounts receivable, loans receivable, and loan guarantees. The organization reduces its risk by performing credit valuations on a regular basis and granting credit on review of the applicant's ability to repay. In the opinion of management, the credit risk exposure to the organization is low and not material.

# (b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices, whether the factors are specific to the instrument or all instruments traded in the market.

## (c) Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The organization is exposed to currency risk with respect to its investments. At December 31, 2019, foreign investments represent approximately 38% (2018 - 30%) of the total investment portfolio.

It is management's opinion that the Diocese is not subject to significant amounts of risks with respect to its financial instruments. The Diocese manages these risks by its Investment Policy Statement. This statement is reviewed annually by the finance committee and establishes policies for the management of its investments, dictates the Diocese's approach to growth, credit quality and profitability objectives. The overall objectives of the policy are to preserve and enhance the value of capital through adequate diversification in high quality investments and achieve the highest investment return within the level of acceptable risk. Subject to limitations, the organization only invests in equities and fixed income.

# 17. Comparative figures

The financial statements have been reclassified, where applicable, to conform to the presentation used in the current year.

# 18. Subsequent events

The outbreak of coronavirus disease (Covid-19) has resulted in the global declaration of a pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020. Government measures in place to combat the health threat of the virus have caused material disruption to businesses globally resulting in an economic slowdown. At this time, the duration and impact of the outbreak are unknown as are the efficacy of government and central bank interventions. It is not possible to reliably estimate the length and severity of the measures nor their impact on the future financial results and conditions of the organization.

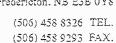

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### **Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report**

To the Members of The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton that comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2020, and the statement of operations and changes in fund balances, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of maleing inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

### Conclusion

### 1. Nature of operations

The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton represents the administrative and episcopal head of the Anglican Church of Canada operations in New Brunswick. The organization is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and, accordingly, is exempt from income taxes.

### 2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The significant accounting policies are detailed as follows:

### (a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of balances held in bank accounts and investment cash accounts with financial institutions.

### (b) Fund accounting

The organization follows the fund basis of accounting which provides for separate groups of accounts to ensure accountability for restricted assets. The funds established by the organization are as follows:

Operating fund reports general activities related to the unrestricted and internally restricted funds. Internally restricted funds include special purpose funds and designated funds reserved for future expenses. Internally designated funds earned interest income based on the closing balance at a rate of 2.75% (2019 - 6.5%).

Capital assets fund reports the assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses related to capital assets.

Externally restricted funds reports activities related to amounts where the donation and related investment income is restricted on usage. There are four separate funds including:

- Diocesan trusts have been established through estate bequests and are generally limited to the use of earnings only. Interest earnings are based on the annual rate of return of the overall performance of the investment portfolio [2020 0.5%; 2019 10%]. No earnings are generated in years with a negative rate of return. Earnings in excess of the restricted capital are distributed as per the terms of each individual trust agreement.
- *Diocesan funds* have been established through estate bequests and other means and may not be limited to the use of earnings only. Interest earnings is calculated on the closing balance at a rate of 2.75% (2019 6.5%). Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.
- Designated funds have been established through donations, bequests, parish assessments, and interest from Diocesan trusts and Diocesan funds. Interest earnings is calculated on the closing balance at a rate of 2.75% (2019 6.5%). Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.
- Special purpose funds have been established through donations for a specified purpose. Interest income is not earned on these funds. Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.

### 2. Significant accounting policies, continued

### (c) Revenue recognition

The organization follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions to its restricted funds. Contributions to the restricted funds are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Unrestricted contributions and revenue from shared ministry and parish assessments are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Contributions restricted for the purpose of capital assets are deferred and amornized into revenue at a rate corresponding to the amortization rate for the related capital assets.

Investment income includes dividends, interest income, foreign exchange, and realized investment gains and losses. Dividend, interest and foreign exchange income is recognized when the right to receive payment is established, net of management fees and transaction costs. Unrealized investment gains and losses reflect the change in the fair market value of the investments at year end and are recognized in the Operating Fund.

### (d) Government assistance

Government assistance for operating expenses received as a result of the Government of Canada COVID response programs is recorded as deferred revenue and is amortized to income as eligible expenditures are incurred. No government assistance related to operating expenses was deferred at year end.

### (e) Investments

Investments are reported at fair value using quoted market prices.

### (f) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined using the average cost method.

### (g) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. The organization provides for amortization using the straight-line method at rates designed to amortize the cost of the capital assets over their estimated useful lives. One half of the year's amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition. No amortization is recorded in the year of disposal. The annual amortization rates are as follows:

### (h) Contributed services

Volunteers contribute time to assist the organization in carrying out its mandate. While these services benefit the organization considerably, a reasonable estimate of their amount and fair value cannot be made and, accordingly, these contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

### (i) Post retirement benefits

The Diocese and its employees participate in a multi-employer contributory defined benefit pension plan (the General Synod Pension Plan of the Anglican Church of Canada). The Diocese also participates in the national Employers Group Benefits Plan (Retirees) which is a defined benefits plan for retired clergy. Both plans are owned and managed by The General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada. The Diocese is only responsible for annual contributions.

In 2020, the pension plan expense for the Diocese office and administrative staff was \$80,103 (2019 - \$76,511). The current year retired clergy benefits plan expense under the administration of the national office was \$89,033 (2019 - 63,814).

### (i) Financial instruments

The organization initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions. The company subsequently measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for securities quoted in an active market, which are subsequently measured at fair value.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, parish receivables, and other receivables, advances to Camp Medley, and parish loans. Financial assets measured at fair market value include investments. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include payables and loan payable.

### (k) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### 7. Camp Medley - Related party

Camp Medley is a Christian youth program offered in New Brunswick that provides residential camping and Christian youth leadership development. The organization is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and, accordingly, is exempt from income taxes.

The Diocese owns the land and buildings on the property known as Camp Medley and appoints the director who oversees the day to day operations. The Diocese, in this capacity, controls this organization. At December 31, 2020 Camp Medley owes the Diocese \$111,033 (2019 - \$110,816). This liability is non-interest bearing with no fixed terms of repayment.

The financial statements of Camp Medley have not been consolidated in the Diocese's financial statements. An unaudited financial summary of Camp Medley as at December 31, 2020 is as follows:

### 8. Guaranteed deposits

The organization has investment agreements with individual parishes and individual clergy members that guarantee the principal amount invested plus any interest income reinvested. The asset and liability associated with these agreements are recorded as guaranteed deposits in the operating fund.

For the parishes, interest income is paid semi-annually with an additional annual interest bonus, both payable at the discretion of the organization. In 2020, interest was paid at a rate of 2.75% (2019 - 6.5%).

For the clergy members, interest was paid monthly based on the closing balance at a rate of 4.5% (2019 - 4.5%).

### 11. Deferred contributions

### 14. Guarantees

The Diocese has guaranteed loans to parishes totaling \$1,002,526, including \$278,043 from The Anglican Foundation of Canada, \$571,987 from other parishes, and \$152,496 from the Bank of Nova Scotia.

The Diocese has guaranteed loans to parishes from The Anglican Foundation of Canada totaling \$278,043 as follows:

- \$100,345 for Parish of the Nerepis and Saint John
- \$ 99,512 for Parish of St. Mary, York
- \$ 66,859 for St. John the Evangelist Church
- \$ 11,327 for St. Mark's Church

The Diocese has guaranteed inter parish loans totaling \$571,987 as follows:

- \$151,769 to the Parish of the Nerepis and St. John from the Parish of Fredericton
- \$131,688 to the Parish of St. Marks from the Parish of Sussex
- \$115,728 to the Parish of St. George from the Parish of Sussex
- \$107,550 to the Parish of Quispamsis from the Parish of Sussex
- \$ 65,252 to the Parish of St. Mark (Stone Church) from the Parish of Saint John (Trinity)

The Diocese has guaranteed the debt of the Parish of the Nerepis and St. John to the Bank of Nova Scotia to a maximum of \$152,496.

### 15. Lease commitments

Certain land and buildings that were part of the original school property have been leased to the Rothesay Netherwood School at a nominal rental of \$1 per year to December 31, 2100.

In 2016, the Diocese entered into an agreement with Partners for Youth Inc. to operate a facility for homeless youth. The property is leased to Partners for Youth Inc. at a nominal rental of \$1 per year.

### 16. Financial instruments

### (a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a transaction will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. The organization's main credit risks relate to its accounts receivable, loans receivable, and loan guarantees. The organization reduces its risk by performing credit valuations on a regular basis and granting credit on review of the applicant's ability to repay. In the opinion of management, the credit risk exposure to the organization is low and not material.

### (b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices, whether the factors are specific to the instrument or all instruments traded in the market.

### (c) Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The organization is exposed to currency risk with respect to its investments. At December 31, 2020, foreign investments represent approximately 44% (2019 - 38%) of the total investment portfolio.

It is management's opinion that the Diocese is not subject to significant amounts of risks with respect to its financial instruments. The Diocese manages these risks by its Investment Policy Statement. This statement is reviewed annually by the finance committee and establishes policies for the management of its investments, dictates the Diocese's approach to growth, credit quality and profitability objectives. The overall objectives of the policy are to preserve and enhance the value of capital through adequate diversification in high quality investments and achieve the highest investment return within the level of acceptable risk. Subject to limitations, the organization only invests in equities and fixed income.

### 17. Other

The outbreak of coronavirus disease (Covid-19) has resulted in the global declaration of a pandemic by the World Health Organization on March 11, 2020. Government measures in place to combat the health threat of the virus have caused material disruption to businesses globally resulting in an economic slowdown. At this time, the duration and impact of the outbreak are unknown as are the efficacy of government and central bank interventions. It is not possible to reliably estimate the length and severity of the measures nor their impact on the future financial results and conditions of the organization. Any impact to December 31, 2020 has been included in these financial statements.

### 18. Government assistance

The organization received government assistance related to supporting organizations during the global pandemic of \$286,623 in wage subsidy relief under the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy program.

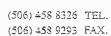

### 1. Nature of operations

The Diocesan Synod of Fredericton represents the administrative and episcopal head of the Anglican Church of Canada operations in New Brunswick. The organization is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and, accordingly, is exempt from income taxes.

### 2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The significant accounting policies are detailed as follows:

### (a) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of balances held in bank accounts and investment cash accounts with financial institutions.

### (b) Fund accounting

The organization follows the fund basis of accounting which provides for separate groups of accounts to ensure accountability for restricted assets. The funds established by the organization are as follows:

**Operating fund** reports general activities related to the unrestricted and internally restricted funds. Internally restricted funds include special purpose funds and designated funds reserved for future expenses. Internally designated funds earned interest income based on the closing balance at a rate of 2.75% (2020 - 2.75%).

Capital assets fund reports the assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses related to capital assets.

**Externally restricted funds** reports activities related to amounts where the donation and related investment income is restricted on usage. There are four separate funds including:

- Diocesan trusts have been established through estate bequests and are generally limited to the use of earnings only. Interest earnings are based on the annual rate of return of the overall performance of the investment portfolio [2021 4.4%; 2020 0.5%]. No earnings are generated in years with a negative rate of return. Earnings in excess of the restricted capital are distributed as per the terms of each individual trust agreement.
- *Diocesan funds* have been established through estate bequests and other means and may not be limited to the use of earnings only. Interest earnings is calculated on the closing balance at a rate of 2.75% (2020 2.75%). Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.
- **Designated funds** have been established through donations, bequests, parish assessments, and interest from Diocesan trusts and Diocesan funds. Interest earnings is calculated on the closing balance at a rate of 2.75% (2020 2.75%). Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.
- *Special purpose* funds have been established through donations for a specified purpose. Interest income is not earned on these funds. Funds are distributed as per the terms of each individual fund.

### 2. Significant accounting policies, continued

### (c) Revenue recognition

The organization follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions to its restricted funds. Contributions to the restricted funds are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Unrestricted contributions and revenue from shared ministry and parish assessments are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Contributions restricted for the purpose of capital assets are deferred and amortized into revenue at a rate corresponding to the amortization rate for the related capital assets.

Investment income includes dividends, interest income, foreign exchange, and realized investment gains and losses. Dividend, interest and foreign exchange income is recognized when the right to receive payment is established, net of management fees and transaction costs. Unrealized investment gains and losses reflect the change in the fair market value of the investments at year end and are recognized in the Operating Fund.

### (d) Government assistance

Government assistance for operating expenses received as a result of the Government of Canada COVID response programs is recorded as deferred revenue and is amortized to income as eligible expenditures are incurred. No government assistance related to operating expenses was deferred at year end.

### (e) Investments

Investments are reported at fair value using quoted market prices.

### (f) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined using the average cost method.

### (g) Capital assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. The organization provides for amortization using the straight-line method at rates designed to amortize the cost of the capital assets over their estimated useful lives. One half of the year's amortization is recorded in the year of acquisition. No amortization is recorded in the year of disposal. The annual amortization rates are as follows:

Buildings Furniture and fixtures 40 years straight-line 5 years straight-line

### (h) Contributed services

Volunteers contribute time to assist the organization in carrying out its mandate. While these services benefit the organization considerably, a reasonable estimate of their amount and fair value cannot be made and, accordingly, these contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

### (i) Post retirement benefits

The Synod and its employees participate in a multi-employer contributory defined benefit pension plan (the General Synod Pension Plan of the Anglican Church of Canada). The Synod also participates in the national Employers Group Benefits Plan (Retirees) which is a defined benefits plan for retired clergy. Both plans are owned and managed by The General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada. The Synod is only responsible for annual contributions.

In 2021, the pension plan expense for the Synod of and administrative staff was \$105,647 (2020 - \$80,103). The current year retired clergy benefits plan expense under the administration of the national office was \$54,663 (2020 - \$89,033).

### (i) Financial instruments

The organization initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions. The organization subsequently measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for securities quoted in an active market, which are subsequently measured at fair value.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, parish receivables, and other receivables, advances to Camp Medley, and parish loans. Financial assets measured at fair market value include investments. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include payables and loan payable.

### (k) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### 7. Camp Medley - Related party

Camp Medley is a Christian youth program offered in New Brunswick that provides residential camping and Christian youth leadership development. The organization is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and, accordingly, is exempt from income taxes.

The Synod owns the land and buildings on the property known as Camp Medley and appoints the director who oversees the day to day operations. The Synod, in this capacity, controls this organization. At December 31, 2021 Camp Medley owes the Synod \$135,155 (2020 - \$111,033). This liability is non-interest bearing with no fixed terms of repayment.

The financial statements of Camp Medley have not been consolidated in the Synod's financial statements. An unaudited financial summary of Camp Medley as at December 31, 2021 is as follows:

### 8. Guaranteed deposits

The organization has investment agreements with individual parishes and individual clergy members that guarantee the principal amount invested plus any interest income reinvested. The asset and liability associated with these agreements are recorded as guaranteed deposits in the operating fund.

For the parishes, interest income is paid semi-annually with an additional annual interest bonus, both payable at the discretion of the organization. In 2021, interest was paid at a rate of 2.75% (2020 - 2.75%).

For the clergy members, interest was paid monthly based on the closing balance at a rate of 4.5% (2020 - 4.5%).

### 14. Guarantees

The Synod has guaranteed loans to parishes totaling \$850,349, including \$261,316 from The Anglican Foundation of Canada, \$450,037 from other parishes, and \$138,996 from the Bank of Nova Scotia.

The Synod has guaranteed loans to parishes from The Anglican Foundation of Canada totaling \$261,316 as follows:

- \$ 98,833 for Parish of the Nerepis and Saint John
- \$ 96,500 for Parish of St. Mary, York
- \$ 60,961 for St. John the Evangelist Church
- \$ 5,022 for St. Mark's Church

The Synod has guaranteed inter parish loans totaling \$450,037 as follows:

\$135,329 to the Parish of the Nerepis and St. John from the Parish of Fredericton

\$101,190 to the Parish of St. Marks from the Parish of Sussex

\$108,387 to the Parish of St. George from the Parish of Sussex

\$105,131 to the Parish of Quispamsis from the Parish of Sussex

The Synod has guaranteed the debt of the Parish of the Nerepis and St. John to the Bank of Nova Scotia to a maximum of \$138,996.

### 15. Lease commitments

Certain land and buildings that were part of the original school property have been leased to the Rothesay Netherwood School at a nominal rental of \$1 per year to December 31, 2100.

In 2016, the Synod entered into an agreement with Partners for Youth Inc. to operate a facility for homeless youth. The property is leased to Partners for Youth Inc. at a nominal rental of \$1 per year.

### 16. Financial instruments

### (a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a transaction will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the other party to incur a financial loss. The organization's main credit risks relate to its accounts receivable, loans receivable, and loan guarantees. The organization reduces its risk by performing credit valuations on a regular basis and granting credit on review of the applicant's ability to repay. In the opinion of management, the credit risk exposure to the organization is low and not material.

### (b) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate as a result of changes in market prices, whether the factors are specific to the instrument or all instruments traded in the market.

### (c) Currency risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The organization is exposed to currency risk with respect to its investments. At December 31, 2021, foreign investments represent approximately 43% (2020 - 44%) of the total investment portfolio.

It is management's opinion that the Synod is not subject to significant amounts of risks with respect to its financial insuments. The Synod manages these risks by its Investment Policy Statement. This statement is reviewed annually by the finance committee and establishes policies for the management of its investments, dictates the Synod's approach to growth, credit quality and profitability objectives. The overall objectives of the policy are to preserve and enhance the value of capital through adequate diversification in high quality investments and achieve the highest investment return within the level of acceptable risk. Subject to limitations, the organization only invests in equities and fixed income.

### 17. Government assistance

In 2021, the organization received government assistance related to supporting organizations during the global pandemic of \$92,041 (2020 - \$286,623) in wage subsidy relief under the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy program.

## INVESTMENT COUNSELLOR'S LETTER

Inflation pressures continued to mount over the first half of the year, with Canada's Consumer Price Index (CPI) rising almost 8% year-over-year in May. Led by surging gas and food prices, the ever-increasing cost of living is hitting consumers hard. When combined with continuing supply chain issues across the globe, and the added strain put on oil and food supplies by the war in Ukraine, the strong upward momentum in prices is driving key central banks to aggressively raise interest rates to stem demand. Since the beginning of 2022, the U.S. Federal Reserve has raised its benchmark interest rate by 1.50%, including a historically large increase of 0.75% in June. The Bank of Canada is expected to match the increase in July.

With monetary policy expected to keep tightening over the coming months, speculation is rising that this may induce a recession within the next year, and this in turn has driven bond prices down and equity markets into either bear-market or correction territory.

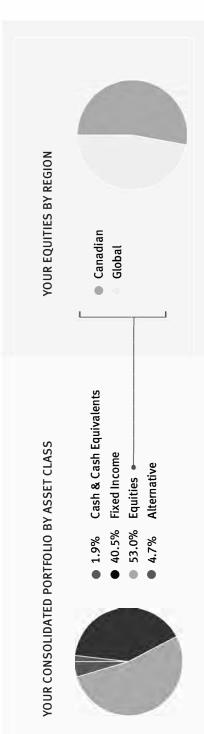

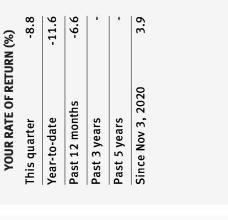

### MARKET COMMENTS

### Where to from here?

Coming into this unusual start to the year, higher inflation was very much the dominant risk investors were focused on. In fact, in our 2022 outlook, we highlighted that inflation variability would be a prominent threat to investors through the year and into next year as well. Inflation fears only escalated in February when Russia invaded Ukraine and oil hit \$120 per barrel. Recently, however, the focus has shifted decisively toward slowing growth, with every major asset class pricing in an economic slowdown, and that inflation is likely to stick around for a little while longer. Market-based measures of volatility have been on the rise since the start of the year, with rather large swings in prices - both higher and lower.

### Few places to hide from the bear

Adding to the woes so far this year have been bond prices, which have moved lower. Investors haven't seen this in some time – simultaneous declines in both bond *and* stock values. Usually there is some degree of offset between the two, but this has been a rather unusual first half of the year. While some pundits have questioned the role of bonds in a portfolio today based on a short time period, we believe the portfolio diversification benefits of bonds remain important. Historically, as inflation volatility declines, the low correlation between bonds and stocks tends to return. We expect that this time won't be any different.

There have really been no places for investors to hide year-to-date, and the unrealized losses across U.S., international and Canadian stocks and bonds have been material. The only positive nominal returns so far this year have been in commodities.

### Entering an official bear market

In mid-June, the leading barometer for equities, the S&P 500 Index, entered official bear market territory. A bear market is defined as a market correction from the prior high of at least -20%. The average bear market over the last 100+

years has lasted just over 2.5 years and the median peak-to-trough decline over that period was just over 35%. Each bear market and correction is different, so these are just goalposts to keep in mind so you can be financially and psychologically ready for what may come next. But there is no secret sauce to timing the market tops and bottoms, so we don't promote such strategies at RBC PH&N Investment Counsel.

However, it's still important to keep in mind that despite the year-to-date unrealized losses, corrections and bear markets are quite normal through time. In fact, the U.S. equity market, which is the most widely followed, has averaged at least one sizeable decline (i.e., 10% or more) every year since 1975, with the average fall being nearly 20%. Yet, the U.S. equity market still managed to generate a positive annual return three quarters of the time over the last 50+ years. In other words, dealing with market volatility is part of the investing experience.

## Important reminders for bear markets

Mentally, it's never easy to get through a bear market. Here are some important reminders about staying invested in bear markets:

- They are inevitable: Bear markets are an ingrained aspect of investing. We know that they will happen; we just cannot know when or why. Expect to see one every six to seven years.
- " **Nobody can call the bottom (or the top):** Market timing is impossible, and this fact does not change during a bear market.
- Lower prices are good for long-term savers: For younger investors saving for the long term, lower market prices are attractive and beneficial to long-run outcomes. (It just won't feel like it at the time!)
- **Emotions will run high:** Our ability to make intelligent, long-term decisions during a bear market is severely compromised. Rational thought will be overcome by the emotional strains we are likely to feel what happens if things keep getting worse and I didn't do anything about it? It is during such times that systematic decision-making such as rebalancing and regular savings –are important.
